CIRCULAR LETTER FROM W. H. HEILEMAN WITH THE DATES

TWO MEETINGS HELD HERE

Circular sets forth the great possibilities of this section, and all should attend who can.

The Klamath Waterusers' association has just received a circular letter from W. H. Heileman, engineer, O and M. department United States reclamation service, under date of August 27th, naming September 6th, 7th and 8th as the dates set for the series of farmers' meetings to be held by the officials of the Oregon Agricultural college at Corvallis. A transcript of the call for these meetings is here with reproduced, as follows:

"Klamath Falls, Ore., Aug. 27.
"Dear Sir:—On dates of September 6th, 7th and 8th the officials of the Oregon Agricultural college will hold a series of farmers' meetings in the Klamath country. On the 6th of the month, at 10 o'clock in the morning and again at 2 o'clock in the afternoon and in the evening meetings will be held at Klamath Falls.

"On the 7th and 8th meetings will be held at Bonanza and Merrill. Programs for these meetings will appear later.

"We will have in attendance from Corvallis President Kerr, Director Withcombe and Professors Lewis and Scudder. These are all able men, and will be well worth hearing.

"Our Klamath district is growing rapidly into prominence and importance. This year we are actually farming over 20,000 under canals, and results everywhere are promising indeed. We need more information about various crops and varieties, about dairying and stock husbandry, and about horticulture. Experts coming in from outside points tell us our possibilities are much greater than are at present surmised. With proper advice and practical effort our district will become one of the best for general farming to be found anywhere on the coast. We can begin right now to use better varieties and make better crops, stop dividing our farm profits with outside interests, and make our farms turn out finished products, instead of just hay and grain.

"These agriculturalists from up the state who will be here in September

are practical men with ability to give reliable information. Millions of dollars are being spent in the various states in agricultural experiments and for the betterment of production, and it is extremely important for us to get informed regarding some of the results.

"You are urged to attend the meetings to be held here. You will be repaid many times over by the information you will get about farm matters if you will come out and listen and ask questions. We want these meetings to be a success and reach the Klamath producer. It will fully pay you to leave your harvest a day, or three days, to come to these meetings.

"We are holding these meetings now because we want these agriculturalists to see Klamath farms at harvest time. They are leaving their work to come to us, and we should certainly give them a little of our time by attending all the meetings and interesting themselves. Very truly,

A MENACE TO HEALTH

GOVERNMENT ASKED TO ABATE ANKENY CANAL NUISANCE

MAY BE MADE INTO PIPE LINE

Dr. Hamilton Fears Typhoid Epidemic and Takes Action as City and County Health Officer.

The old Ankeny ditch has been condemned by City and County Health Officer Dr. R. R. Hamilton, and he will call upon the government officials this afternoon with the request that they convert the same into a pipe line or fill it up. Dr. Hamilton, in speaking of this menace to the city, said:

"This ditch is a menace to the general health of the city, and it is my intention as city and county health officer to call upon the government officials this afternoon and request them to remedy this evil.

"This canal, in the condition it is in, is the receptacle for all sorts of germ-breeding filth. The water, after being contaminated, seeps down through the ground under the buildings, and it is a marvel that we have not had an epidemic of typhoid fever from this source ere this. It is up to the government to convert this canal into a pipe line or fill it up. It has been the custom to flush the canal to clean it out, but this does no good, as the dead carcasses sink to the bottom and remain there—a perfect disease-germ source. I am acting in this matter strictly on a sanitary standpoint, and also in conjunction with the city officials."

DUCKS CAN BE SHIPPED

ACCORDING TO ATTORNEY GENERAL CRAWFORD

DECISION IS OF IMPORTANCE

No Matter If They Do Go Into California at Weed, the Shipment Is Not an Illegal One.

An important ruling by Attorney General Crawford of this State makes it possible to ship ducks by express out of this city, to any point in this State, as will be seen by the following letter which was received by Well-Fargo Agent Parker of this city:

Mr. J. J. Parker, Agent, Klamath Falls, Ore.

Dear Sir: Referring to yours of August 3d, relative to legality of shipping wild ducks from Klamath Falls, Ore., to other points in Oregon, passing through the Weed, Cal., gateway:

I requested Route Agent Rapp to take the matter up with the State Game Commissioner, which he did, and you already have a copy of his letter of August 19th to me, and I now enclose herewith copy of letter from Mr. R. O. Stevenson, State Game and Forestry Warden, dated Forest Grove, Ore., August 18th, to Route Agent Rapp, in which is quoted Attorney General Crawford's ruling to the effect that shipment of game from Klamath county to Portland, although passing out of the State of Oregon en route, is not an interstate shipment under certain court decisions which he has quoted, and such shipments may, therefore, be made in the same manner as other shipments within the State are made.

Dear Sir: As per your request, I am sending you a ruling of the Attorney General in regard to shipping of game.

The following is a copy of a part of Mr. Crawford's letter:

"With reference to the letter of Mr. Rapp, I would say that shipment of game from Klamath county to Portland, although it passes out of the State en route, is not an interstate shipment under the decisions of the courts: Lehigh Valley Railroad company vs. Pennsylvania, 145 U. S. 192, 205; Campbell vs. Chicago Railroad company, 86 Ia. 587 (53 N. W. 351). Therefore, such shipments will be made in the same manner as other shipments within the State are made."
