Northward the course of empire takes its way. A tugboat steamed out of Vancouver, B. C., yesterday with a barge loaded with a 75-ton locomotive, 24 flatcars and a caboose. This rolling stock is bound for Prince Rupert, where it will be the first to be used on the Western division of the Grand Trunk Pacific. When the Canadian Pacific was built across the continent it was thought that it ran too far north to prove a profitable investment. The same prediction has been made in the case of the new road now building. Our "frontier" is becoming so restricted, however, that it is not improbable that a few years hence some daring railroad builders will be spanning the continent with a line having feeders running up to the Arctic coast.
