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Subjects Discussed Can Only Be Summed, as Neither Man Has Anything to Say

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HOUSTON STILL REFUSES TO TALK

SAYS HE HAS NOTHING TO SAY ABOUT LOCAL CHARGE

WILL ARRIVE HERE SATURDAY

Appears Not to Worry About the Frictionment Into Which He Has Been Drawn

PORTLAND, July 1.—Barnes and Claude Dagget, who have in charge T. E. York, alias F. B. Houston, who is wanted in Klamath Falls for swindling the American Bank and Trust company of that city, left here for there last evening. Before his departure York was asked if he had any statement to make relative to the charge on which he was apprehended. He replied that he was not trying his case in the papers, and that he would not say a word to anyone until he had consulted his attorney. When asked what he meant by the statement that he would have no difficulty in proving his innocence of the charge, he made no reply.

York was apparently the most unconcerned one of the party. He was in a cheerful mood, and did not seem in the least worried over the fact that he was in the clutches of the law. If he has any idea of trying to escape the vigilance of Sheriff Barnes he is laboring under a false hope, for every move that he makes has the closest watch by that officer.

According to the above Houston would be due to reach this city on tomorrow evening's train. There will doubtless be a large crowd in waiting at the station to greet this famous swindler, but it is not likely that it will get a glimpse of him. It is more than likely that the sheriff will take him from the train at some point before the city is reached and whisk him to jail in an auto. Sheriff Barnes has no desire to do the spectacular, and the probability is he will do what he can to land his man in jail without passing the gauntlet of curiosity seekers.

SOCIALISTS' ENCAMPMENT

AGITATOR TOM WILSON AGAIN MOVED THE WORKINGMAN

BIG MEETING FOR TOMORROW NIGHT

None of the Leading Speakers of the Encampment Preparing to Return to Their Homes

The Thursday afternoon meeting was full of interest to the few hundred thoughtful men and women who were present. The orchestra rendered several fine selections at the opening and closing of the address of J. Blitt Wilson, which was as sane and sensible as it was radical. Owing to the audience being comparatively small and largely socialistic, at least in sympathy, he proposed to change his announced topic, "The Bible Argument for Socialism," to an exposition of the most advanced program of the worldwide socialist movement as it has been thus far formulated. A truth dropped into a mass of normal minds is incubated, like the egg under the sitting bird. If after a proper period the truth turns out no appropriate and practical program, or the egg no living nestling, it is fair to assume that the truth, or the egg, has become addled. The world movement for socialism or social justice has passed through the period of incubation, the period of theorizing, and entered the period when it must turn out its plans of constructive state-manship. In this respect American socialism is far behind that of many European countries. We have a lot of theoretic socialists, but while great numbers of socialists sit in foreign halls of legislation, no avowed socialist is a member of the congress, and scarcely can one be found in any state of legislature. No American city of note, till Milwaukee, has ever placed its municipal affairs in socialist hands.

The speaker told what New Zealand has done in a socialistic way since 1880, has broken up the great unused tracts of land like those in all our Middle and far Western states by heavy taxation of land values, and has lent money to the people on just as favorable terms as our government gives to J. P. Morgan when he wants to borrow his money. Thousands of propertyless New Zealanders have in consequence been able to produce and are now enjoying private property. Private property is only accessible to the people when social property belongs to the community, and is administered for the common benefit.

Taking up briefly the subject of religion, it was stated that the Bible contains the full argument for socialism in both the Old and the New Testaments. Moses was the first great labor leader and the first and greatest labor reformer mentioned in history. He was even a violent labor leader. He killed a taskmaster and buried him in the sand. Read Isaiah carefully and see what kind of a socialist he was. And the whole teaching and spirit of the Man of Nazareth is summed up in "I come to set at liberty

them that are bound."

The evening assembly showed no diminution of numbers or interest, and Tom Lewis was almost as entertaining as the vaudeville, though his subject was full of history and philosophy dispensed in his spicy and humorous style. He caricatured the old parties, living and dead, and the workingmen for being deceived and perennially duped by them. The great hit of his discourse was an imitation of a socialist campaign speech, wherein he would have passed with any blind Californian for George Knight himself. Those who claim hearing Tom Lewis are being the most unique and by no means the least significant feature of the encampment.

At the socialist conference this morning an important change was made in regard to the meeting tomorrow night, when the debate between former State Senator R. S. Smith, democrat, and Edward Adams Cantrell, socialist, will take place. The following announcement has been issued by the committee:

"In view of the fact that the seating arrangements in the big tent, the immense crowds that gather there and the natural tendency of a large part of the audience to leave at the conclusion of the address without waiting for the final vaudeville performance, has interfered with the necessary collections, the encampment conference has decided on a change in the arrangements for the collection Saturday night."

"The expenses for that day are to be increased by the sum of \$100 to be paid former Senator Smith for his part in the battle of Socialism against mind, and doctrine against doctrine. For this reason every one willing to contribute toward the expense must be given the opportunity, and the only practicable way of doing this seems to be to take the collection at the door. This will be the method followed Saturday night."

The subject chosen by Mr. Smith, out of three submitted by the socialist committee, is as follows:

"Resolved, that Socialism is in Harmony With the Best Traditions and the Highest Ideals of the American People."

This position will be defended by Mr. Cantrell, while Mr. Smith will try to show that it is not true.

The four vaudeville artists, Williams and Wright and Mr. and Mrs. Bob Miller, are rehearsing a turn in which all will appear together.

Last night, for the first time in the course of the encampment, cheers were given the speaker of the evening by the audience. Tow Lewis, speaking on the "Significance of Political Parties," more than justified the designation of "agitator" which has been given him in approval or semi-approval by socialists or half-socialists, and in condemnation by the opponents of the movement.

After the meeting on the encampment grounds, the socialist party members adjourned to Red Men's hall as guests of that order at a banquet. Brief addresses were delivered in the hall by Edward Adams Cantrell, Tom Lewis, Mrs. Dorothy Johns, J. Blitt Wilson, Cloudesley Johns, and by Jesse Tyrrell and W. E. Beethorn of the Red Men.

J. Blitt Wilson left this morning for Los Angeles, where one of the big meetings of the socialist campaign in California is to be held July 4th.
