M. W. Coseboom, who is farming the Ellis & Albright place, was in the city yesterday. He has been putting up his first crop of alfalfa during the

past week. He reports the yield exceptionally good, the average being about two tons to the acre. Speaking of crop conditions, Mr. Coseboom said: "Dry land crops, generally speaking, are not good. The spring has been a little too dry. Some of the grain fields look pretty well. Under the ditch all crops look well. In my opinion the farmers under the ditch are going to make more money this year than last. The price of both hay and grain will be higher. The indications are that the second cutting of alfalfa will be heavier than the first."

OREGON TRUNK TO BUILD SPUR INTO BIG TIMBER BELT

Weyerhaeuser to Establish Mill on Deschutes—80-Mile Contract Let on Natron-Vale Branch

CRESCENT, Ore., July 1.—Railroad activity, which was temporarily suspended recently by reason of the order holding up construction on the south seventy miles of the Oregon Trunk line, gives promise of renewal in the awarding of eighty-five miles of construction work by the Southern Pacific to Erickson & Peterson, contractors. It is understood the work is to be done on the Natron-Vale branch of the new road now building toward Crescent from Eugene. A camp at Hazel Dell just across the range has been connected with the Hoey ranch, twelve miles west, where a force of Southern Pacific men is employed building a wagon road so that freight and supplies may be taken to the camps. Although no official announcement has been made, it is asserted on good authority that a construction camp will be established this side of the summit, within thirty miles of Crescent, within thirty days.

The preliminary survey of the Natron-Vale line runs about a mile south of Crescent, but negotiations are now on foot for the purchase of right of way through the town and the railroad has secured from the interior department permission to change its survey through the forest reserve, with the intention, it is stated, of bringing the line into Crescent. A depot will likely be put in here. General Manager O'Brien of the O. R. & N. visited here last week and made a tour of the valley to the south of here, looking over the work on the line from Klamath Falls, building in the direction of Crescent. The Oregon Trunk line has purchased right of way for a spur to the Weyerhaeuser properties in the timber belt along the Deschutes river, which passes through the townsite holdings. The lumber company plans a large mill at this point as soon as the railroads reach here.

DANCED IN THE JAWS OF DEATH

Passengers Aboard Burning Vessel Enjoy Themselves, Unconscious of Their Great Danger

PHILADELPHIA, July 1.—While the crew of the Atlantic Coast liner Grecian engaged in a race with death, threatened by a fire in the oil laden hold of the vessel, eighty passengers aboard danced in the cabin, oblivious to danger. News of the fire had been kept from them. The captain's wife volunteered to prevent a panic, and started to play dance music, keeping at her post until the vessel reached port, playing continuously. As soon as the terrible danger was over the brave woman collapsed.

The fire was discovered at sea about midnight, and was kept under control until the vessel reached here. A wireless message notified the authorities of the vessel's predicament, and fire companies were awaiting her arrival, and the fight with the fire was taken up immediately. Dozens of firemen are in the hospital from

being overcome with the dense smoke from the hold. The passengers were transferred by tug in safety, and no fatalities occurred. The vessel was laden with oil and wool for Boston.

UNDER THE BIG KNIFE

PARIS, July 1.—Labeuf, the apache convicted of the murder of a policeman, was guillotined today at sunrise. Thousands of revolutionists and socialists surrounded the place of execution, and in attempting to disperse the crowd one policeman was killed and hundreds of the mob were injured, some, perhaps, fatally. The condemned man posed as a martyr.
