ECONOMY WORKERS POSTAL EMPLOYEES

No Provision Made for Increase in Salaries of \$1,500 or More.

Economy in the postal department which the nation is praising is hitting one class of employees with a precision which they do not appreciate. For those receiving \$1,500 or more the civil service promotion rules or postal regulations don't provide for increase. The law says that certain supervisory officers may get not to exceed a certain percentage of the postmaster's income. One set may get 45 per cent and another 35 per cent. But the advancing of these officers from \$1,500 up to the percentages named is for Congress.

In the Portland office, like many of the Western institutions, the supervisory officers are getting comparatively low pay. Their Eastern fellow workers for the same duties and responsibilities, get more. Assistant Postmaster W. E. Williamson had determined to have a provision inserted in the new appropriation bill providing for fair increases for the twenty supervisory officers under him. He set forth in his report and recommendations that one set, which was authorized to get as high as \$2,700 under present conditions at Portland, in fact gets but \$1,500 a year, another set that could be paid \$2,400 under the general law, was getting but \$1,400. With these facts as basis, the recommendation went to the general department, and thence to Congress. But information received indicates that provision has been made for no increase whatever in these classes, because of the stringent economy being attempted.

Out West, where the postmaster's salaries have been advanced rapidly to the maximum, all the supervisory employees have not kept pace like in the East, where the growth has been slower. This accounts for the difference in the two regions. Making it doubly hard upon the employees employed within these classes is the fact that out West the cost of living is much higher and salaries here should always be larger for the same duties.

TAFT WILL HASTEN IRRIGATION WORK

Indications Are That Funds From the Bonds Will Not Be Drawn Against for a Year

WASHINGTON, D. C., July 2.—Senators Borah and Jones have been urging President Taft to make early allotments to Idaho and Washington projects from the \$20,000,000 fund set aside by Congress. This he has promised to do. As no allotments can be made for any project until it is examined by a board of engineers, both senators urged the president to appoint four or five boards, which he promised to do. The senators urged that, as far as possible, engineer officers now in the West be appointed for this work.

The president has no doubt as to the feasibility of the Idaho and Washington projects, but cannot approve any until after examination by the engineers.

Representative Ellis today urged Secretary Ballinger to give Oregon a liberal allotment from the new fund. The secretary said he could make no promises until after examination had been made by army engineers. Personally, the secretary is not favorably impressed with the Umatilla project, and the Klamath project has already been diminished. These are the only projects in Oregon to which allotments can be made, and the prospects are not encouraging.

Senators Carter, Smoot and Dickinson were among the other callers at the White House who discussed this subject with the president. They, too, want to have the inspection engineers at work at the earliest possible moment, so as to complete plans heretofore made. It is expected that the president will name General Marshall, ex-chief of engineers, as head of the main commission.
