for the finishing of the Umatilla project, which is estimated to require not to exceed \$200,000. These funds will become available from the division of the funds arising from the sale of public lands in each state. The new bond law does not interfere with that feature of the old law. The new law does, however, do away with the clause which provides that a majority of the funds received from the sale of lands in Oregon should be expended in that state. The clause providing that such funds as were utilized in other states should be repaid to Oregon within ten years has been repealed. Washington, Idaho, Montana and other arid states owe Oregon more than \$5,000,000 which should have been repaid before 1912.

There now appears to be no way by which that money can be recovered to reclamation projects in Oregon. Representative Ellis hoped that the president would see that the money was refunded from the \$20,000,000 bond issue, or at least that the states which are indebted to Oregon would be cut short in their allotments and the amount added to that which Oregon had a right to expect.

The reclamation service at Washington has approved the extension of the Umatilla project, which would have required \$3,000,000 to complete. It is considered to be a better plan than the original project. The attitude of Secretary Hallinger does not encourage the idea that the bond fund will aid in the construction. If the Umatilla extension is completed it will come along slowly, as the funds are available from the sale of public lands in Oregon.

After five years a portion of the funds secured from the sale of lands in Oregon will be set aside for the redemption of the bonds in which the state does not appear to share.

"FEARLESS JO" CONVICTED OF FIRST DEGREE MURDER

Grant County Deputy Sheriff Who Allowed Lynching Will Have to Suffer for Act

CANYON CITY, Ore., July 1.—The nerve that earned for him the sobriquet of "Fearless Jo" flashed in an amused twinkle of the eye this morning when the jury brought in a verdict of murder in the first degree against Deputy Sheriff Joseph H. Casaday of Grant county for the killing of Ollie Snyder. The jury had been out all night. Casaday knew the prosecution had made a strong case, but he slept soundly last night, and, except for the twinkle, he displayed no emotion when the jury this morning branded him murderer and traitor to the state.

Deputy Sheriff Casaday was sent to Hamilton last fall to convey to the Grant county jail at Canyon City Ollie Snyder, a sheepherder, who had shot and killed Arthur Green, a cattleman. Snyder had been captured by a citizens' posse from Hamilton after a twenty-four hours' chase.

It was brought out at Casaday's trial that he conspired with four other men to lynch and shoot Snyder. Casaday and his prisoner left Hamilton for Canyon City at 3 o'clock in the morning. About two miles from Hamilton they were met by four men, who took Casaday's prisoner. After Casaday had ridden a short distance down the road the four men tied a rope about Snyder's neck and filled his body with bullets.

The four men who are alleged to have conspired with Deputy Casaday are Ben Hinton, Emmet Shields, Earl Shields and Arthur Green, a brother of the man Ollie Snyder killed. All of the five defendants are in the Grant county jail at Canyon City. Casaday is the second defendant to be tried. Hinton is said to have made a signed confession which implicates not only the three remaining defendants, but several prominent stockmen of Grant county. More arrests are expected.

The trial of the other three defendants will be called as rapidly as possible. None will be sentenced until all have been tried.
