OREGON MAY GET PART OF TWENTY MILLION

Had This State's Senators Been Wide Awake the Amount Might Have Been Larger.

WASHINGTON, July 11.—When President Taft cuts the \$20,000,000 irrigation melon he may invite Oregon to sit down to the feast, along with those Western states whose senators were instrumental in bringing about the passage of the irrigation bond bill. But if the invitation is extended it will be largely because of the friendly intercession of Secretary Ballinger, who maintains that while the law does not require any allotment to Oregon, his neighboring state is equitably entitled to share in the benefits to accrue under the expenditure of the fund, even though the senators of that state contributed nothing to the success of the measure.

Under the law, the distribution of this \$20,000,000 fund is entrusted to the president, and so restraint whatever is placed upon him, inasmuch as the bond bill repealed section 9 of the reclamation act, which guaranteed to each state the full use of a majority of the money it contributed to the reclamation fund. In making allotments, however, the president will defer largely to the judgment of the secretary of the interior, and the reports of the board of army engineers, and if that board does not make it utterly impossible, the secretary will exert himself to procure a slice of the "melon" for Oregon.

Had the Oregon senators been awake and active when the \$20,000,000 bill was being passed there would have been no necessity for this intercession on the part of Secretary Ballinger or anybody else, for Oregon is now nearly \$3,000,000 behind in its allotment under the original reclamation act, and this shortage would, of necessity have been made up by June 17, 1912, and it would have taken a liberal allotment from the \$20,000,000 fund to make good this shortage.

But the Oregon senators, utterly oblivious of the significance of what was taking place before their eyes, sat quietly by and permitted the repeal of section 9 of the reclamation act, without so much as raising a voice in protest.

It would perhaps be a little more than retributive justice should Oregon fail to receive any part of the \$20,000,000 fund.

The total expenditure in Oregon, according to the latest reports, or rather the total allotment to date, is \$1,250,000 for the Umatilla project and \$3,250,000 for the Klamath, or \$4,500,000 in all. Not all the benefits of the Klamath allotment accrue to Oregon, part being in California, so that on any equitable basis Oregon, to get a square deal, should receive out of the \$20,000,000 at least enough to build the west side Umatilla extension or a little over \$2,500,000.
