NINETY VETERANS PASS AWAY DAILY
32,000 Grand Army Men Answer to Last Roll-Call Every Year

WASHINGTON, D. C., July 11.—The great army that defended the Union, as indicated by the pension rolls, is rapidly passing away. At present about ninety names a day are dropped from the pension rolls. This average is equivalent to about 2,700 deaths a month, or about 32,000 annually, among Federal survivors of the Civil War carried on the pension lists.

There are no pensioners of the Revolution or War of 1812 living. The last survivor of the Revolution on the pension rolls was Daniel F. Blakeman, who died at Freedom, Cataugous county, N. Y., April 5, 1869, aged 109 years, six months and eight days. The last pensioner of the Revolution was Esther Damon, of Plymouth Union, Vt., who died November 11, 1906, aged 92 years. There is now only one pensioner on account of the Revolution remaining on the roll. She is Mrs. Phoebe M. Palmer, aged 89 years, of Brookfield, N. Y., pensioned by special act of Congress as the daughter of Jonathan Woolsey, who served in a New Hampshire company.

The last surviving pensioner of the War of 1812 was Hiram Cronk, of Ava, N. Y., who died May 13, 1905, aged 105 years and 16 days. The names of 395 widows of the War of 1812 remained on the pension roll June 30, 1909. The last survivor of the Revolution lived to be four years older than the last survivor of the War of 1812 and until four years after the close of the Civil War.

The last survivor of the Revolution on the rolls lived for 86 years after the close of that war. If there is any soldier of the Civil War who will live 86 years after the close of the conflict in which he fought, his name will remain on the pension rolls until 1951. The last survivor of the War of 1812 lived 90 years after the end of that struggle. According to these instances the country may be paying a pension to the last soldier of the Civil War in 1955.

The actual number of survivors of the Civil War on the pension rolls June 30, 1909, was 593,961. At the close of the Spanish war, in 1908, there were 726,446 Civil War survivors on the pension rolls. These figures relate only to soldiers and sailors who actually fought in the war and do

not include widows, children or orphans.

The number of names of Civil War survivors stricken from the pension rolls on account of death last year was 32,831; in 1908, 34,333; in 1907, 31,301; in 1906, 29,208; or a total of 127,573 dropped from the rolls on account of death in four years, and the fiscal year, which will close with the end of the present month, will show about 32,000 more dropped for the same reason. This is the rate at which the pensioned old soldier is passing.

Senator McCumber of the Senate Pension Committee, has just caused to be prepared an interesting table relative to the ages of soldiers at the times of enlistment. This table shows that of the total number of enlistments, aggregating 2,778,309, for the Union army and navy, the number of enlistments at various ages was as follows:

At ten years and under, 25; at 11 years and under, 38; at 12 years and under, 22; at 13 years and under, 300; at 14 years and under 1525; at 15 years and under, 104,987; at 16 years and under, 231,051; at 17 years and under, 844,891; at 18 years and under, 1,151,438; at 21 years and under, 2,159,798; at 22 years and older, 618,511; at 25 years and older, 46,626; at 44 years and over, 16,071.

This table shows that for more than a million enlistments were of men under 18. The pension authorities, therefore, figure that the average age of pensioners of the Civil War is now about 68 years.

MRS. FRANK GOULD TO MARRY AGAIN

NEW YORK, July 11.—Mrs. Helen Kelly Gould, until August of last year Mrs. Frank J. Gould, and Ralph Hill Thomas, assistant treasurer of the American Sugar Refining company, have taken out a marriage license, but refuse to give the date for the wedding.

Mrs. Gould gave her name as Helen Kelly Gould, age 26. The evening of the same day that the license was gotten Mrs. Gould and Thomas, with two men, dined at the Hotel Knickerbocker and left together in an automobile. It is believed that the couple have engaged passage for Europe for Tuesday and will be married before that time.

Frank Gould and his wife were separated on August 24, 1909, after a series of domestic trouble caused by Gould's jealousy.

There were two children, Helen and Dorothy. Mrs. Gould is the granddaughter of Eugene Kelly, a prominent banker and Roman Catholic layman.

Frank Gould Marries.
NEW YORK, July 11.—Since the announcement that his wife is about to marry Thomas, Frank Gould has confirmed the rumor of his marriage to Edith Kelly, the actress, in Paris, five weeks ago. The news had been withheld at Gould's request until his wife should remarry or publish her engagement.

TIP OF BOY'S TONGUE SEWED ON BY DOCTOR

NEW YORK, July 11.—The tip of a little boy's tongue, which he had bitten off, was sewed on by Dr. Thomas Platt at Dunellen, N. J., and medical men in that part of New Jersey have begun to watch eagerly for the outcome. The boy was William Smith, 4 years old, son of H. C. Smith. He was running along a street with his tongue out a little when he stumbled, fell, and bit off the tongue tip. The severed part was about an inch long. He was hurried to Dr. Platt's office and the operation was performed at once. Should it not prove successful the youngster's speech, of course, will be impaired permanently.

FIRE THREATENS TOWNS IN MICHIGAN

LANING, July 11.—The towns of Ripley, Powers and Greenwood, in northern Michigan, are threatened by the first forest fires of the season. Lake Superior is covered with the smoke from the burning woods and the homesteaders are feeling from the cabins. Settlements are in danger of destruction and the state is preparing to make a systematic effort to fight the flames.

NO POSTAL BANKS TILL 1911

CHICAGO, July 11.—Postmaster General Hitchcock, who was in this city today, expressed the opinion that no postal savings bank could be established before January 1, 1911. He made this statement during a conversation with Postmaster Campbell, who asked that one of the first banks be placed in operation here.

AEROPLANE TO CARRY FREIGHT TO NEW YORK
Monster Airship Now Being Built by Capitalists at Rochester for That Purpose

ROCHESTER, N. Y., July 11.—Backed, he says, by capitalists interested in the development of airships for commercial purposes, John F. Cooley, an airship designer and builder, is here rushing to completion the largest aeroplane in the world. The big airship will be finished inside of two weeks, Cooley expects, and then he will give an exhibition flight here. These trial flights will be crowned, if all works well, by a flight from Rochester to New York, making one stop at Albany. The machine is to be four times larger than any other aeroplane in the world.

The airship has the appearance of a yacht with a hull eighty feet long. Two sets of engines of sixty horsepower each will furnish the power, each being able to propel the aeroplane so that the failure of one will not cause disaster. The aeroplane will be able to carry several passengers, it is claimed, and 4000 pounds of freight.

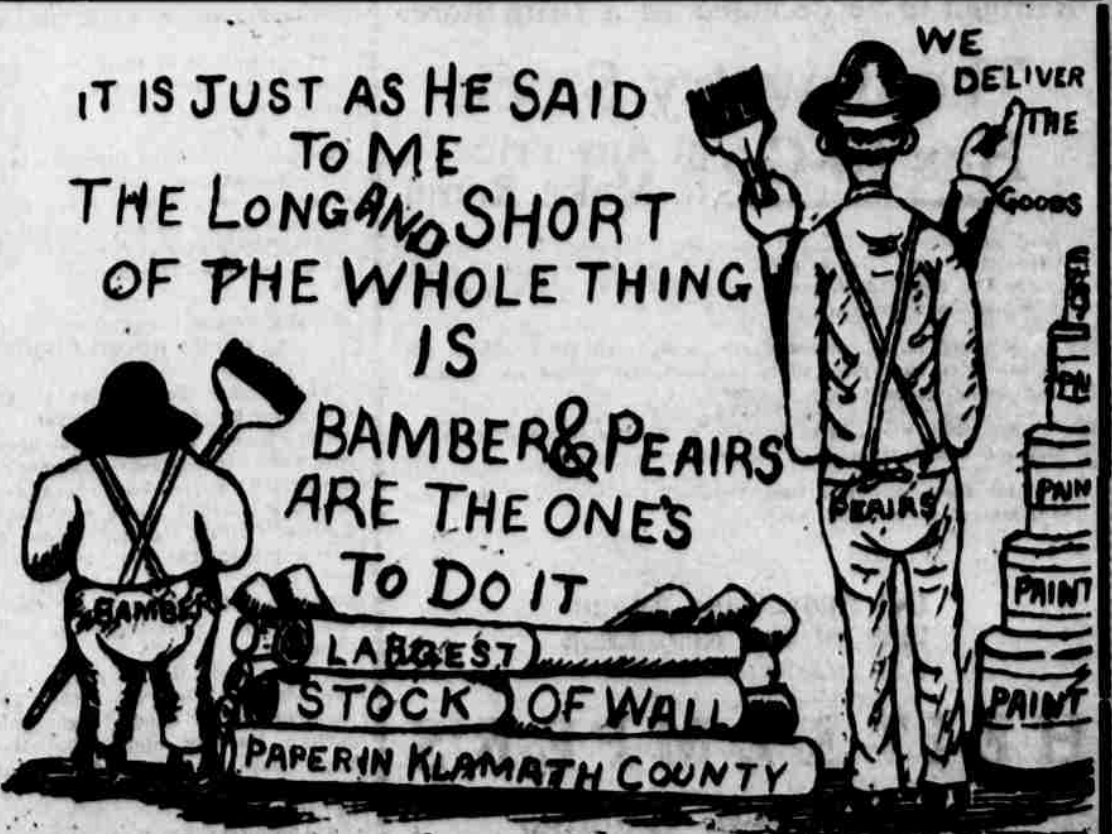
