NEED FOR BETTER ROADS APPLE SHOW AT PORTLAND

IMPROVED HIGHWAYS WILL DO MUCH FOR THE STATE

WILL BE HELD IN THAT CITY IN NOVEMBER

BENEFIT WILL BE INCALCULABLE

STATE TO HAVE MAJOR RESERVE

Cost Would Be But Trifling Compared With the Good That Would Be Derived

Deep Waterway From Grays Harbor to the Columbia is Being Considered

While he was in the city Monday the Herald reporter had an interesting conversation with John A. Gelatly, mayor of Wenatchee, Wash., who had just arrived from that city in his Thomas flyer. He left Wenatchee with his wife and family to visit his brother, W. A. Gelatly, who is sheriff of Benton county, Oregon, and after visiting in Corvallis he came to Klamath Falls by way of Crater lake.

In answer to the question, "How did you find the roads?" he replied: "The roads from Eugene to Medford were simply awful. They were almost impassable, and there is one thing that the automobile associations and the various commercial bodies should take up, and that is the proper routing of the highways of the country."

PORTLAND, July 12.—An annual apple show that will reach big proportions has been determined on for Portland. The first such exhibit will be held in November, and it is expected to have the entire state represented in a way never before attempted. The Commercial club, business men and hotel men's associations have all entered heartily into the project at the instance of the Oregon State Horticultural society, which proposes to celebrate its quarter centennial this fall by inaugurating a big annual apple fair that is expected to grow with each passing year until it attains proportions where it will attract national interest.

Oregon, in addition to an efficient state militia, is to have an organization of naval reserves. Steps have already been taken to form such an organization, which will maintain the same relation to the navy in time of war that the militia does to the army. Ex-navy men and others interested formed a temporary organization at Portland during the past week. This will be made permanent as soon as possible.

Hibernians from all over the United States will visit Portland next week, coming to attend the annual convention of the A. O. H., which opens here July 19th. It is estimated that no less than 20,000 people from all parts of the country will come to Portland at that time, attracted by the convention, and the favorable rates made on account of it. Oregon has a chance to impress itself favorably upon this great number of people, and there is no doubt it will make the most of the opportunity.

Willamette valley dairymen are to have the chance of listening to one of the greatest experts in dairying in the world, when Professor Bernhard Boeggild of the Royal Danish Agricultural college at Copenhagen arrives here July 19th. Oregon City, Corvallis, Salem, Albany, Forest Grove and McMinnville will be visited and the Commercial clubs will entertain the visiting expert. He is studying American dairy conditions, and he will no doubt give many hints in his talks that will be of great value to the industry in Oregon.

Preliminaries for the annual livestock show and races at the Country club grounds next September are now under way, and the arrangements indicate this year's show will be more successful than any. The fair will open on Labor Day, and not only Portland people, but those of outside points are interested in its success.

Gray's Harbor people are talking over the project of building a canal from that waterway through Willapa Harbor to the Columbia river, thus giving a deepwater, dependable channel to the sea. One meeting has already been held, and the people are considering it seriously. It is said such a project will not cost over \$1,000,000, and in addition to its aid to navigation, will drain a territory covering 10,000 acres of marsh land, now practically worthless.

NEW YORK, July 12.—Fifty firms have capitulated to the garment workers, who are on strike here, and have signed the union scale. Chairman Block of the union's executive board said that now the strike is practically won, as the other employers must settle.

DON'T NEGLECT THE ORCHARD

No one thing seems more difficult to impress upon the minds of the farmer and fruit grower than the fact that the orchard, like other growing crops needs care and culture, and that when neglected they will tell the sad story, the same as other farm crops. No crop will repay care and cultivation better than an orchard, and no crop will suffer more by neglect. For the first five or six years the trees should be cultivated, and after this a system of cultivation, cover crops and grasses may be introduced, according to the growth of the trees and the amount of the fruit produced.

On most soils there will be sufficient natural fertility to produce a favorable growth of wood, and I believe that it will be more profitable to use no fertilizer until after the trees begin to produce fruit. Sometimes when the soil is deficient in available plant food it may be an advantage to use a mineral fertilizer, but as a rule, better trees are grown from the natural fertility of the soil, and that a better root system is developed than when there is manure and commercial fertilizers used to hasten the growth of the trees.

After the roots interlock each other so that they occupy all of the soil, they have utilized practically all of the available plant food in the soil, and if the trees produce superior fruit they must be liberally fertilized. The use of legumes as a source of nitrogen and an incomplete fertilizer rich in phosphoric acid and potash is the most economical method of fertilizing the orchard.—Western Farm Journal.
