PROMPT PARCEL DELIVERY

From Liverpool to Manchester the
distance is about 30 miles, and be-
tween the two cities are hourly ex-
press trains upon which small parcels
of merchandise are forwarded with
celerity and cheapness, as the Amer-
ican consul at Liverpool reports. Parcels
collected in either city before
10:15 in the morning are delivered in
the other city within an hour and a
quarter. From the central office and
from warehouses, large stores and
agencies in both cities regular col-
lections are made, varying from two to
eight daily. Parcels collected in Liver-
pool up to noon are delivered the
same day to all places within a radius
of 150 miles.

For a package weighing two pounds
or less there is a uniform rate of 8
cents to all places in England and
Wales and to Irish ports; three-pound
packages pay 10 cents, four-pound, 12
cents, and greater weights up to 25
pounds preserve the same rate of 12
cents for the first 80 miles, increas-
ing after that with the weight and
distance.

Corresponding rates in the United
States would be more than double,
but when the population of this coun-
try becomes as dense as that of Eng-
land, and large cities as close togeth-
er, we shall doubtless have corre-
spondingly as low rates, even if the
parcels post has not come.—Boston
Globe.

BUILDING ROAD AT PINE FLAT

**COUNTY MAKING NEW HIGHWAY
AT THAT PLACE**

Interesting Debate at the School
House Sunday Morning—Other
News From Day

The county commissioners have be-
gun a most commendable piece of
work on the grade across Pine Flat,
and the machinery and force of men
and teams are getting on with it in a
satisfactory manner. The county's
rockcrusher is at work crushing the
material near the foot of the Meter
hill, and teams are carrying the
crushed rock to the grade and giving
it an eight-inch coating, making a
permanent hard-surfaced roadbed
over the mile and a half of what has
been the worst road in the county
during the wet season. Half a mile
further down Road Supervisor Uhr-
man, with a small force of men and
teams, is making a new road over
the Low hill, which promises also to
be a valuable improvement.

horses for a farmer in Langell valley,

The Dairy school house was the
scene of an interesting religious dis-
cussion last Sunday over the ques-
tion whether Saturday or Sunday
