ALL HENLEY SUITS ARE SETTLED OUT OF COURT

Amicable Termination of Litigation Involving Large Interests

One of the most important legal settlements that has been made in this county for years was concluded today by the filing with the county clerk of certain documents that bring to a close all of the litigation heretofore existing between J. D. Carroll and Mrs. Sophia Henley. These suits have been occupying the attention of the court for several months, and at one time promised to be as famous as some of the cases that have been noted for the period of time for which they claimed the legal machinery of the respective districts where the suits were pending.

The property involved was the well-known Henley ranch, which was occupied and worked for several years by Mr. Carroll. Through some misunderstanding between the parties the question of final settlement was thrown into the courts. One of the cases arising out of the controversy has already reached the supreme court. Now, however, the matter has been adjusted to the satisfaction of the parties interested.

The conditions of settlement provide for the turning over of the property to Mrs. Henley, in consideration of which and as liquidated damages Mr. Carroll is given a receipt in full for all claims held by the former. Mr. Carroll today turned the property over, paying as a full settlement of everything the sum of \$135. The friends of both parties will be glad to learn that such a satisfactory termination of the suits has been reached.
