MAIDMAN DRIVES AUTO DRIVER

Asks for Lift, Then Draws Gun and Demands Speed Exhibition.
20 Miles of Terror

ELGIN, Ill., July 14.—With a madman armed with a revolver as a passenger, Fred Ackerman, a wealthy cattle buyer, was compelled to drive his automobile at terrific speed for twenty miles over rough roads, according to the story he told today to the local authorities. Ackerman was driving between Elgin and Hampshire when he overtook a pedestrian who asked for a "lift." The man climbed in and after Ackerman had driven a short distance whipped a revolver from his pocket, leveled it at Ackerman and commanded him to "show some speed."
As the whirling car reached the outskirts of Hampshire Ackerman told his passenger that the gasoline tank must be refilled. Ackerman entered a garage and summoned help. The man with the gun struggled with four garage employees ten minutes before he was overcome. He gave his name as Roy Andrews. It is believed he had escaped from an asylum.

FARMER JURORS EXCUSED

Judge McMaster Lets Off Men That They May Have Hay Crop

VANCOUVER, Wash., July 14.—Because more than half of the jurors subpoenaed for the July term of superior court have hay down, and desire to get it in, Judge McMaster excused four of them for one week.
One juror said: "I am thankful I haven't any hay down, your honor, but I have a sawmill, and you know no man looks after one's business so well as the man himself." He was excused.

GERMAN TAKEN SICK IN FRONT OF COURTHOUSE

Otto Ambuhl Suffers From an Epileptic Fit for Several Hours

Yesterday afternoon Otto Ambuhl, a German, who has been doing odd chores about the city, was taken with an epileptic fit in front of the courthouse and suffered severely for over three hours.
Chief of Police Townsend and Officer Sam Walker noticed that there was something wrong with the man while he was sitting on a bench near the corner of the square. They carried the man to the shade of the trees and summoned Dr. F. M. White. The man was stricken about 3:45, and it was not until a little after 7 o'clock that he was able to sit up and tell who he was.
The two officers and the doctor, as well as Deputy Sheriff John Schallock cared for the man, fanning him constantly until he was out of danger. The skill of the physician and the careful attention of the policemen was all that saved the man's life.
Ambuhl is a German, and came to this country from Hamburg several years ago. He has no particular calling, and makes his living by doing any kind of manual labor.

WOMAN SHOT BY MAN IN LOVE WITH HER

NEW YORK, July 14.—Mrs. Antoinette Skoors was found in her room with three wounds in her body, any one of which would have caused death. It was said at first that she was shot by a burglar. Later her husband found letters among her effects from Casimir Malski which indicated that Malski shot the woman. Malski was arrested and admitted that he committed the act. He said that he had loved the woman while they were in Austria and that they had agreed to die together. Malski shot her and then attempted to commit suicide, but failed to consummate the act.

AVIATOR CRUSHED BY FALL FROM BALLOON

Gas Bag Burst and Occupants of Dirigible Are Crushed Beyond Recognition

COLOGNE, July 14.—The dirigible balloon Erbelech, named after its inventor, fell 5,000 feet near Pascheid, West Germany, yesterday and Erbelech, who is a renowned scientist, and four of his companions were killed. The bodies were crushed beyond recognition.
The dirigible balloon which fell belonged to the Rhine Aerial club and resembled the Zeppelin, but was only about one-sixth as large. It had made several successful flights and ascended at Dusseldorf this morning. Near Pascheid one of the balloon's nets burst and all the gas bags were torn to bits. The cause of the accident is unknown.
The voyage lasted forty minutes and it is thought that the sun expanded the gas bag so much that the nets broke or else that the motor exploded. Erbelech piloted the winning balloon Pommern at the International races at St. Louis in 1907.

MRS. HARTJE WILL BE GRANTED DIVORCE

PITTSBURG, July 14.—An absolute divorce will be granted Mrs. Mary Hartje from Augustus Hartje, her multi-millionaire husband. Mrs. Hartje asked Judge Fraser to grant an absolute divorce. Mr. Hartje did not object and the court took the case under advisement. The decree will probably be signed later.

CLERKS GIVEN EXPENSES

Government at Last Allows Men in Mail Service 75 Cents Daily

After a fight which has been carried on for many years, United States railway postal clerks have been allowed an expense account not to exceed 75 cents per day, beginning at the expiration of the first twelve hours they are on a run, says the Oregonian.
In addition to being among the most poorly paid of government employees, the boys who handle the mail sacks are often called upon to make trips covering as many as two days and nights. Many of them see their homes only once a week. On all these trips the men have heretofore been called upon to pay all their own expenses.
Under the new arrangement, the mail clerks will continue to sleep on a heap of mail sacks in the mail cars, but will be allowed to purchase three 25-cent meals each day at the expense of the United States. The order was received yesterday at the office of Postmaster Merrick, and will be placed in effect at once. The mail clerks believe they will be able to secure an increased allowance as the years go by, and regard the present allowance as a means to that end.
