

TO AMEND PRIMARY LAW

SENATOR ABRAHAM THINKS HE CAN IMPROVE IT

Would Preserve Party Organization and Eliminate "Bad Features" of Law as It Now Stands

Amendments to Oregon's direct primary law, designed to preserve party organization, eliminate many bad features of the measure as it stands, and preclude, as nearly as possible, fraud in registration, are proposed by Albert Abraham, state senator, of Roseburg. Senator Abraham is in Portland, and brought with him copies of the Hiram-Green and Cobb compromise primary laws proposed in New York, says the Oregonian.

These bills in the main bore the endorsement of President Taft, ex-President Roosevelt and Governor Hughes, and the amendments proposed by Senator Abraham are taken from the bills.

"I intend introducing them in the next session of the state legislature," he said. "I believe we ought to take advantage of the study and thought that these measures represent."

Three central ideas are to be included in the amendments, he said. One of these provides the manner in which the names of candidates in the primary may be placed on the ballot, its purpose being two-fold. One is to preserve party organization, and the other intends the selection of the best material for party candidates.

This is to be accomplished by an authorized committee of each party. At each primary election "it is proposed each precinct shall elect men to serve on the party committee. This committee is to meet before the next primary election and make recommendations of names as party candidates. This, however, does not bar others from becoming candidates in the same manner as is now followed by petition, but the party recommended candidates are to be given a preferential place on the ballot. It is proposed also to abolish the

printing of slogans opposite the names of candidates excepting as to position on Statement 1. Another proposed amendment contemplates doing away with the practice of persons not in sympathy with a party registering as members of such party.

After the party affiliations of the registered voters are made known, anyone has the right to question the sincerity of any voter in the statement of his politics and through the party machinery to take up the matter in a summary way with a court of competent jurisdiction and have the name canceled if the voter is found to be false. This would do away, it is thought, with insincerity and fraud in party registration, as it is said to have had that effect in New York state.

"It is essential, in order to get a full understanding of the excellency of the Hughes play of party committee recommendations to describe the method of procedure under which alone the committees may act," said Senator Abraham. "Meetings for the purpose of making designations are required to be open to the public. A roll call of the members of the committee is completely called in alphabetical order or in the order which may have previously been adopted by rule, for the purpose of ascertaining the names of those proposed as candidates. Upon such roll call each member of the committee who desires to propose a candidate, or candidates, must rise and declare the name of such candidate or candidates. The roll is then called a second time for voting upon the candidates proposed. As each name is called the member votes and the secretary records the vote. If any candidate receives a majority of all the votes, which the members of the committee are entitled to cast, whether present or not, such candidate is deemed designated by the committee. If no one receives a majority of the votes, the roll is called again in like manner as the first roll call, for the purpose of again proposing candidates, and a vote is then taken upon a fourth roll call in like manner as upon the second roll. This procedure is continued until the proper majority is received. Record is kept of the proceedings and is required to be filed with the custodian of records."

DAIRY INDUSTRY VERY GREAT

MOST IMPORTANT FEATURE OF FARM WORK

Value of Products Over a Billion Dollars Every Year—Wonderful Progress Made

According to the last year book of the department of agriculture there are 21,729,000 milk cows in the United States, and these are worth \$702,945,000. The magnitude of the industry can perhaps be best understood when it is considered that these cows produce yearly about \$1,000,000,000 worth of dairy products. There is no other branch of diversified agriculture so important to the progress of a community. The fertility of the soil can best be maintained by the liberal use of barnyard manure, and the dairy herd not only makes this possible, but dairying is also more remunerative than other branches of farming when properly carried on.

Dairying has made wonderful progress since the advent of the modern creamery, and the consumer of butter has not only been benefited by being furnished a more wholesome and palatable article of food, but the wife in the farm house has been relieved of the drudgery incidental to making butter on the farm. Where formerly the cream was ripened and churned into butter under conditions not conducive to fine quality in the finished product, and in the majority of cases by unskilled hands, now the most of the milk or cream is delivered to a modern creamery where conditions are suited to the purpose of making better, and the result has been a wonderful improvement in the quality of our dairy products. As the quality has improved consumption has increased, and the progress of dairying has been remarkable during the past decade.

The perpetuity of the country's greatness depends upon increasing the production of farm products from year to year, a result which not only furnishes our people with food but maintains the prosperity of our

farming communities. Increase in production can only come through improved methods of agriculture and soil improvement. When it is considered that the dairy cow is the foundation for soil improvement and farming prosperity, her importance is best understood, and interest in her should not be confined to her owner. She is an important factor in the development of our country.

SUE O. T. MCKENDREE

Seek to Recover \$15 Claimed to Be Due for Services—They Are Awarded That Sum

Last night the suit of J. M. Ellsworth and George Mitchell against O. T. McKendree of Lakeview for \$15 for services for the inspection of a

lot of sheep belonging to the latter, was decided in favor of the plaintiffs, and judgment was given them for the \$15 sought and costs. On February 17th a herder in charge of a band of sheep which Mr. McKendree was preparing to have shipped called upon Mr. Mitchell and asked him to inspect them. He did so, and sent the bill, \$15, to Mr. McKendree, who refused to pay it, giving as his reason the fact that he had not authorized the man to make such a request.

It was necessary that the sheep be inspected before they could be shipped out of the state, but it was the duty of the federal inspector to do that. He inspected the herd later, however, but after Mr. Mitchell had performed his labors.

Justice Miller awarded the claim of the plaintiff and the costs of the suit.

A notice of appeal was given.

H. M. Manning was attorney for the plaintiff, while Thomas Drake appeared for the defendant.
