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SAN PEDRO AS A TERMINAL

DECISION OF INTERSTATE COMMISSION IMPORTANT

Means a Great Saving in Shipments to Los Angeles and Other Southern Ports

WASHINGTON, D. C., July 20.—The Interstate Commerce commission today ordered that San Pedro, Calif., be made a terminal rate point. The decision is most important to Los Angeles in its fight to make that city a seaport. Freight may now be put down at Idewater via Los Angeles at the Los Angeles rate, as all rail rates from the east to San Pedro have previously been based on through rates to Los Angeles plus local rates from Los Angeles to San Pedro.

The decision says that Los Angeles was originally made the terminal rate point because of its nearness to San Pedro harbor has been contributing at this time to the maintenance of terminal rates to Los Angeles. Therefore it is held that the Southern Pacific and other roads have been unlawfully discriminating against San Pedro in making it also a terminal point.
