NEW SCHOOL BUILDINGS

CONTRACTORS RUBY ON SEVERAL
NEW STRUCTURES

Brick Is Being Laid on West Side
Grammar School—Plans Accepted in District 35

Work is progressing rapidly on the school buildings that are going up in various parts of the county.

The new grammar school on the west side of Link river in this city has the foundation completed and the bricklayers are busy laying the brick for the walls.

Sand and rock for the foundation for the Henley school a few miles south of this city has been hauled to the grounds, and the foundation will be completed by Saturday. The carpenters are at work there now, and the frame will be put up Monday.

Material will be hauled for the city school today and tomorrow, and work will start on that building Monday.

The plans and specifications for a new school house at Malin, in District No. 35, have been accepted, and bids will be called for its construction soon. It will be a two-room frame structure, 32x50 feet, with two rooms 24x32. There are to be cloak rooms for both the boys and girls, as well as the teachers. A library and lavatory are also to be added. The building will be heated with a furnace, and the expectation is to make it one of the most up-to-date and complete structures of its kind in this part of the state.

All of the schools are to be ready for occupancy this fall.

Klamath county and this city are sparing no efforts to satisfy the demand for up-to-date schools, and in this respect the citizens of this locality have advantages equal to those of any section of the state.

KIENINGER RELEASED

REDUCED RANGE FORCES SALE OF BIG HERDS

BURNS, Ore., July 20.—Considerable property has changed hands in Harney county lately to outside capitalists. The parties who bought the Wagon Road land grant have sold several choice tracts for \$60 an acre, and several of the small ranchers that have been in Harney Valley for several years have disposed of their land and stock to outside buyers at high prices. Most of them sold out on account of the short range and the prospects for a short hay crop. Since the settlers have taken up the government land stockmen have had to rustle for range, and it has made the raising of stock in large herds a losing business the past two years. The new owners of the land will put their holdings to producing grain and raise stock in smaller numbers. There have been more cattle sold here this year than for several years by the small stockmen.

JEW'S STILL BEING EXPELLED FROM RUSSIA
