PASMORE TRIO STANDS AMONG THE LEADERS

W. L. Hubbard, the Famous Chicago Tribune Critic, Speaks Highly of Their Ability.

Years of hard work is the secret of their artistic success, but the gift of knowing what the public wants and furnishing it is accountable for the esteem in which they are held by the concert going public of two hemispheres. Versatile to a degree, the trio gives programs that range from the plaintive strains of "The Old Folks at Home" to the famous Tschalkowsky trio in all its dramatic intensity. In the solo work, which forms a large portion of the concerts, exquisite piano numbers follow the sobbing songs of the cello. Then come the violin selections and the ensemble numbers, in which all the artists take part. From beginning to end the auditor is held spellbound by these noted musicians.
The people of Klamath Falls are favored indeed to have the privilege of again hearing the Pasmares, who will appear at the opera house Monday evening, July 25th—one night only.
