**OPPORTUNITIES ARE HERE
FOR EVERY MAN**
Energy and Perseverance Combined
With Knowledge of His Calling
Are What Is Needed

To the man who has energy and
perseverance and the willingness to
work hard, together with a knowledge
of his calling, Klamath county offers
opportunities that cannot be excelled
anywhere else. E. R. C. (Bob) Wil-
liams, who lives southeast of this city,
brought that fact forcibly to the mind
of the reporter this week.

Last year Mr. Williams purchased
100 acres of raw land six miles south-
east of town, and this spring he start-
ed to clear it. It was covered with
sage brush, and had never had any-
thing done to it, but he buckled down
to the work and did everything him-
self, cleared the sage brush, dug the
ditches, plowed and planted the land,
and now has in seventy-five acres of
wheat, oats and barley and twenty-
five acres of alfalfa. The alfalfa was
sowed the 6th of this month, and is
now up in fine shape. He has just
finished irrigating, and will have a
good crop of hay this year, although
it is the first crop grown on the land,
and he was late in getting it in.

Mr. Williams is now feeding twenty-
three cows, the cream from which he
disposes of here in Klamath Falls. He
will cut all of his crop for hay and
will buy more cows as soon as he can
care for them. He expects to have a
model farm in about three years, and
in five years will have one of the best
dairies in the county, and will
then be on "Easy street."

This is only one instance of what
one man with energy and perseverance
has done in this county, and what
others could do if they would only try.

**MUSICAL ARTISTS AS
THEY ARE NOT**
Humorous Description of a Pianist
Who Is Not Like Any of the
Pamphleteers

In the scrap book of Suzanne Pas-
more, pianist with the famous Pas-
more trio, one finds the following
humorous bit by a well known Ger-
man critic, and under which the
author has written in ink, "Miss Su-
zanne as she is not."

"The pianist attracts audiences by
personality and hair. These grant-
ed, the next thing is ju-jitsu, for
the piano in many respects resem-
bles a human antagonist. Personal
charm must be cultivated; a lock of
hair that falls into the right eye and
has to be tossed back is a sure draw.

The bow consists in slightly inclin-
ing the head with great deliberation.
The smile is reserved until the third
recall, and then must be sparingly
used. The public likes a smile that
has to be worked hard for. It should
be the smile of a sick man at an in-
different joke. For technique there
is nothing like the good old English
pastime of boxing. It should be
studied first without and then with
the piano. The knock-out blow is
useful in climaxes. The fairy-like
touch is the opposite of this; it
should be practiced on the piano
with hot keys. Preliminary exer-
cises may be done on the kitchen
stove. The bouncing fist is also use-
ful. To give prominence to a single
note make the whole arm rigid from
the shoulder, rise slightly from the
seat and drop the whole weight of
the body on the note. As to ges-
ticulation, keep the hands as far from
the keys as possible when they are
not in contact with them. The roll-
ing head is employed in expressive
passages; in vigorous music jerk the
head back after each accent, being
careful not to dislocate the neck.
When playing pp. assume an attitude
of listening intently. If the note
makes no sound, the audience imag-
ines that the sound of their breath-
ing or of their whiskers growing
has drowned that of the piano, and
sigh "wonderful." Shutting the eyes
in a capital device, though risky, but
be sure that your audience sees you
do it."

The author of this article might
have written under it "The Pamphleteer
as they are not," for one of the
chief attractions of the trio is the
simplicity with which they perform.
Artist of the premier type, it is not
necessary for them to hide defects
in tone and technique by means of
exaggerated gyrations and freakish
mannerisms.
