FORMOSA NATIVES ARE HARD TO CONQUER

Japanese Forces Forced to Make Their Subjugation a Matter of Butchery

VICTORIA, B. C., July 21.—News of real war in the Japanese-Formosa trouble was brought by the steamer Ava Maru. The Japanese forces are now building entrenched lines with blockhouses flanking the Formosans, the total length to date being 307 miles.

The fighting is now thickest in the dense Formosan forests, and in the mountains three to four thousand feet above the sea, where the Japanese artillery is proving almost useless.

The Japanese are now mounting guns on high hills, from which the native strongholds can be bombarded. The Japanese in five detachments resumed fighting July 2d, and drove the natives from their mountain stronghold with heavy loss.

The Japanese losses are scant in attack compared with those during the bivouac, when the natives creep up and begin sniping.

SUFFRAGISTS MAY INVADE

NEW YORK, July 23.—The exclusive residential section of the city, in which is located the home of J. P. Morgan, is facing invasion by suffragettes, if present plans go through.

The suffragettes, headed by Mrs. Clarence Mackay, are negotiating for the purchase of the mansion of the late T. Henry Mason at Madison avenue and Thirty-sixth street. They propose to make of this structure the first suffragists' home in America.

Morgan's residence is directly across the street.

COUGARS GET GOATS OF COTTAGE GROVE

COTTAGE GROVE, Ore., July 23.—Elisha Geer, a rancher residing twelve miles south of this city, shot and killed a cougar measuring nine feet. The ranchers of that neighborhood have been missing goats from their bands for some time past, and when they went on their cougar hunt they found the carcasses of five in the hills. They at once set out to hunt the cougar, and the dogs treed it within an hour. Cougars have killed thirty-eight goats in this neighborhood this spring and summer.
