GETTING INTERESTING FOR PROFESSOR VAN LIEW

CHICO, July 23.—Sentiment is di-
vided in the trial of Prof. Van Liew,
principal of the state normal school
at this place, who is charged with
lugging Miss Ada Clark, aged 17,
who was a pupil of the school until
recently. Prof. Van Liew today was
paler than yesterday, and consulted
his attorneys frequently. A number
of witnesses testified as to the de-
fendant's conduct at the school. The
witnesses were strenuously cross-ex-
amined. The spectators were so noisy
that Chairman Goggins was frequent-
ly forced to rap for order.

Elmer Rankin testified to having
seen Prof. Van Liew drink twelve
beers in one hour. He admitted that
Van Liew tried to force him to cease
his attentions to a normal student
when Rankin was attending school,
but said that he was not prejudiced
against the professor. There was
a great deal of wrangling among the
opposing attorneys.
