DIAMOND WORTH \$150,000 IS FOUND IN AFRICAN MINE

That Value, Uncut; Stone Held to Be Two Inches Long and Flawless

NEW YORK, July 25.—A fine white diamond weighing 191 carats and worth \$150,000 uncut, is the latest find at the Premier mine, in South Africa, according to advices which reached Maiden Lane dealers this week. The stone is described as absolutely flawless, measuring two inches long by about three-fourths of an inch thick. It tapers in breadth from one end to a quarter of an inch to three-quarters of an inch.

A Maiden Lane expert said that judging from the description of the ancient stone, the largest of the diamonds that could be cut from it would be pear shaped. The diamond should be worth at least \$250,000.
