NEWSY NOTES FROM DAIRY

FRED BECK TO HAVE PRIVATE IRRIGATION SYSTEM

Road Across Pine Flat Being Rushed.

Kill Cattle Belonging to Harrison Brown

Fred Beck, who lives in the north part of the valley, who was educated in Germany as a civil engineer, and practiced it for several years, and also took lessons in hydraulics, has been putting his knowledge into practical use lately by formulating plans for building a dam across the mouth of a ravine or gulch on his farm, intending to use it for creating a reservoir for water with which to irrigate his farm land. He proposes to build a dam 17 feet in height, which cannot be washed out—no matter how much of a flood comes. He has put his plans on paper, and has figured out to a dot how many acre feet of water it will hold and how many yards of dirt he will have to move to build it. He proposes to do the work himself—with the help of his boys—and knows every detail of the work. The upper slope of the dam will have a slant of three feet out to one in height, and the lower slope will be two feet to one. His conduit or flume through the dam will be built either of concrete or sewer tiling, amply protected by concrete wings or collars. He wants water on his land and means to have it.

Harrison Brown, the Klamath Indian farmer, has been able to prove that the beef hide which some "rustler" tried to burn up, near the head of Williamson river, was taken from a yearling belonging to him, and has begun proceedings against some squaw men who are believed to have killed the animal. It is the only case of cattle stealing known in these parts for many years.

Stock raisers in the north part of the valley were warned last Tuesday that the Klamath Indians would make a raid on the stock running on Squaw Flat the latter part of the week, and riders were sent up there post haste to drive the stock off that part of the reservation, so that none would be captured by the Indian raiders. Wednesday and Thursday were busy days for the buckaroos.

The Dairy P. M. "hollered before he was hurt," by his hasty denial of having failed to mail postal cards. The item in my last week's letter referred to another postoffice entirely. Possibly I should have been more specific. Sorry he took it as an attack on him, as no one can find fault with him in that regard.

The new house on the Dave Shook ranch is about completed, and the family can again be "at home" to friends. W. H. Bliss has been doing the carpenter work—which means that it has been well done.

Numbers of people complain that the grocery merchants of Klamath Falls all sell at a common price, and the surmise is that they are in a combination. If such is the case it will do the town no good.

Miss Ella Anderson of Dairy, accompanied her father, G. G. Anderson, to the Yamsey mountain country Monday morning, where he is working as a forest ranger, for a week's outing.

Foreman Phillips is pushing the work of building the crushed rock road across the Pine Flat grade in a most vigorous manner, and will be through in about ten more days.

Dan Driscoll of Bonanza was a Dairy visitor Friday, calling on his friends, A. L. Michael and wife. He expects to go to Salem to visit with his children shortly.

Portions of Yonna Valley were blessed with a fine shower last Wednesday, but, unfortunately, the rain didn't extend over much of the valley.

The ground is awful dry, but still the wheat seems to look well and continues to grow. We surely have a remarkably fine soil in this country.

Road Supervisor Uhrmann is very short of help in his road-making work owing to the fact that nearly everybody is busy haying.

Too bad about that Seaton girl getting away, wasn't it? Didn't imagine she had enough wit to turn such a trick.

It will be a close shave for some

farmers to have enough hay for their stock the coming winter.
