MAKING A SUCCESS WITH HIS POULTRY
J. W. Lathrop Has Eight Hundred Chickens and Expects to Raise About 1,500 More

Klamath county is an ideal place for raising poultry, and the market is never overstocked. All of the eggs and chickens that can be raised here find ready sale in this city, and the various resorts and this statement is true all the year round.
Among the new comers who have realized that fact is J. W. Lathrop, who came here from Reno, Nev., last December and purchased eighty acres of the rich soil that lies at the foot of Stukel mountain. The place was not improved when he purchased it, and he has cleared the ground and planted a garden and cherry trees, and now has one of the neatest places in that part of the county. He has seven acres of as fine potatoes as a man ever saw, and has beets in his garden that are four inches across, all raised without irrigation.
Mr. Lathrop received his first shipment of poultry on January 25th, and now has 800 of the finest White Leghorn chickens there are on the coast. He has two strains, the Imperials, a 225-egg strain, and the Diamond, a 250-egg strain, and some of them laid when they were four months and three days old.
He says that this country is an ideal spot for poultry raising, and that he will not stop until he has 2,500 laying hens.
It only requires a knowledge of one's business and a little perserverance to make anything pay in this country.

CUMMINS TALKS ON OPERATION OF TRUSTS
COTTONWOOD FALLS, Kan., July 27.—Senator A. B. Cummins of Iowa spoke at the Chautauqua here yesterday afternoon. The senator said that he chose to deliver a sermon on the text of "Justice," rather than talk on political interests because it was the Sabbath day. Then he proceeded to attack the steel trust and the oil trust particularly to say John D. Rockefeller and Andrew Carnegie.

"Both of these gigantic financiers are exponents of grave injustice to this country," he declared. "The millions of dollars which they give to the public for the building of libraries and educational institutions are nothing more than returning a part of their great profits to the American people by way of atonement. However, that sort of atonement will never expiate the wrongs that they have one in the fields of industry."

The senator avoided politics as he had declared he would, until near the close of his address when he paid a glowing tribute to Senator Bristow.

"A braver and truer man to his policies than Bristow has never been seen on the senate floor," were his words.

SELF-CONFESSED TRAIN ROBBER HELD AT NOISE
BOISE, Idaho, July 27.—After a course of severe questioning, Chief of Detectives Jones, of the Ofegon Short Line, yesterday decided to leave "Bud" Rogers, who says he belongs to the gang that held up a passenger train a few miles north of Ogden, June 27, in the county jail here pending further investigation of the man's story.

Rogers says he participated in various crimes, including the robbery of a bank safe in Post Falls, Idaho, the robbery of a depot in Seattle at the time of the exposition, and held-up of a passenger train at Rathdrum, Idaho, in 1908. Jones says Rogers may be insane.

REVOLT BREWING IN SPAIN

THOUSANDS OF SOLDIERS ARE ARMED AND READY
Martial Law Has Been Practically Established—Agitators Are Urging General Strike

BARCELONIA, July 27.—Ten thousand troops and 2,000 gendarmes have been armed and are now occupying strategical positions here, expecting a revolution. Martial law has been practically established, although the constitution has not yet been suspended. A veteran reinforcement has been mobilized at Sasigossa, Valencia, and are prepared for any emergency. Troops are all ready, and trains have steam up, ready to start on a moment's notice. Censorship of news is very strict, especially at the frontier. Agitators are urging a general strike Friday.

CRISIS IN WHEAT IS OVER OWING TO RAIN
CHICAGO, July 27.—It is believed in the wheat trade that the worst has been heard regarding the spring wheat crop of North America.
Rains, last week checked the backward tendency that was universally conceded for the spring wheat crop in a good part of the northwest on both sides of the international line. Harvest is now getting rapidly under way this side of the line, and it may soon be followed by a revision of market values in that section.
Meanwhile the trade here is waiting for the first big run of new winter wheat. It is starting a little later than last year, but promises to be considerable for a time at least. Upon the extent and continuance of this run very largely depends the course of the market for the year.
There are problems ahead of the present crop that have never before been considered. There is no foreign outlet, while the domestic trade is only just recovering from the effects of reckless overloading. The crop, if statistics are of value, appears to be adjusted to about normal home needs with a modest margin for export.
World's shipments are running down to a modest total despite the fact that Russian forwardings continue very large and the Indian shipments are increasing.

GEISLER WITHDRAWS HIS NAME FROM BALLOT
SALEM, Ore., July 27.—Theodore J. Geisler, who recently announced himself as being a candidate for circuit judge of Multnomah county, has informed the secretary of state's office that he desires to withdraw and cancel his declaration in order to support the republican assembly nominee, J. V. Veatch. This is the first candidate to withdraw from the field, and the secretary of state will strike Mr. Geisler's declaration from the ballot.

EXCURSION SUNDAY
A number of former citizens of Colorado have made arrangements for an excursion to Rocky Point on the steamer Winoma next Sunday, and it is expected that a large number will be on hand to take the trip. AMERICAN SETTLERS RETURN FROM CANADA

WASHINGTON, July 27.—Migration from the central and northwestern parts of the country, including Western Canada, to the southern and southeastern states, is attracting the attention of the immigration authorities. The bureau of immigration officials expect soon to receive a special report from Montreal bearing on the subject of immigration, including the return of Americans to this country, and pending receipt of that report, decline to discuss the matter for publication.
Industrial experts say the movement to the southeastern states will begin next October. A record-breaking migration in this direction occurred last year, drawing upon the population of the central states.
