POLICE AND INDIANS CLASH

**SEVERAL KILLED IN BATTLE ON
RANCH SUNDAY**

Authorities Are Now Sure of the Mur-
ders of the Four
Stockmen

RENO, Feb. 28.—In a battle be-
tween state police and the Indians
who killed four ranchers, 40 miles
west of Tucuman at Keller's ranch,
Indians were killed, four captured,
two squaws and two children were
killed accidentally and a squaw and
two children were captured. The
fight began at twelve and lasted for
three hours.

State policeman Hoyle was killed
in the fight. As the Indians opened
fire first the police are sure they are
the same bunch who murdered the
four stockmen.

Stock Jobbing Alleged

SAN FRANCISCO, Feb. 28.—Frank
C. Avery, a contracting engineer of
Kansas City, Mo., has been arrested
by federal authorities on the charge
of having used the United States
mail in a fraudulent stock selling
scheme. The Electric Traction Co.
of Kansas City is the concern alleged
to have been used by Avery.

PIG ASPHALT DEPOSIT IS FOUND IN CANADA

EDMONTON, Alberta, Feb. 28.—
"As asphalt enough to pave the entire
continent," is the way N. Menasco,
a French expert, describes the deposit
of asphalt at Ft. McKay which he
has been investigating for a syndi-
cate. "The deposit is 275 feet deep
and covers some 40 square miles. It
is the richest find of asphalt ever
made and its quality is of the high-
est." The deposit is 280 miles north
of this city.

ASKS FOR MORE OFFICERS

**CONFERENCE COMMITTEE FAILS
TO COME TO AGREEMENT**

Recommendation of 612 For National
Guard Duty Causes Split at
Washington

WASHINGTON, Feb. 28.—Provi-
sion for adding extra officers to the
army for detail with national guard
is tied up in the conference com-
mittee on account of a disagreement be-
tween the Senate and House over the
number to be added.

No provision for extra officers was
made in the army bill as it passed
the House, and when the bill was
in the Senate it was amended by pro-
viding for 612 additional officers for
the army for distribution among the
several branches of the service and
30 additional officers for the quar-
termaster's department.

This amendment was rejected in
the House and the conference com-
mittee on the army bill reported a
disagreement on this item. When
this report was considered in the
House the matter was sent back to
the conference with instructions that
the house would accept 200 extra
officers and 30 for the quartermaster
department.

The question is still in conference
and it is believed the final result will
be a compromise between the Sen-
ate and the House on the basis of
520 additional officers, including 30
for the quartermaster department.

Additional officers are to be as-
signed to duty with the national
guard during the coming four years,
and vacancies thus caused in the reg-
ular organization will be filled by pro-
motions from the lowest grades and
new appointments of second lieuten-
ants.

THIS FAMILIA EATS NOTHING IN THE COOKED FOOD LINE

PITTSFIELD, Mass., Feb. 28.—A
family of vegetarians live on a farm
in the north woods, three miles from
here. Mr. and Mrs. Alfred Taylor and
three children eat no meat and drink
nothing but milk or water. All the
food for the table, including cereals,
potatoes, turnips, parsnips, onions,
and cabbage, is prepared for the table
without cooking. Apples form a large
part of their diet.

Tyler, who is a Second Adventist,
believes all meat unclean, and that
cooking makes vegetables unhealthy.
Their son, O. B. Joyful Tyler, a boy
of 6, is a pupil at the Russell School
of this city, and eats six raw potatoes
for his luncheon. None of the chil-
dren has ever tasted meat.
