MUNICIPAL OWNERSHIP

WHILE it was the general belief that municipal ownership would carry at the city election, yet the big majority that it received was a great surprise to many. There were only 174 votes cast against it, and unless the sentiment changes it would look as if a bond issue for this purpose would receive sufficient support from the taxpayers to pass. There are many difficulties in the way of the City of Klamath Falls acquiring light and water plants, and we do not believe that this will be done, at least not during the next four or five years. However, the people have rendered their decision in the matter in no uncertain voice, and it is the duty of the officers elected to do their utmost to carry out the wishes of those who have placed them in office. While it is only natural that all men should not believe alike, even on important matters, yet the minority must concede the right of the majority to have their wishes carried out and enforced. We believe that Mayor Sanderson has enough members in the council who will back him in any honest effort he might make to give the people of Klamath Falls municipal ownership of lights and water systems. With full power and authority it is now up to the officers to do their utmost to secure what the people have almost unanimously demanded.

THE ELECTION

"JUST what I told you" is the expression being generally used today and you also hear "I knew it all the time," when yesterday's election is being discussed. In the contest for mayor it was generally conceded that Mr. Sanderson had a big advantage and would poll a large vote. Mr. Murray received a very flattering vote under the circumstances. He received over twice the votes that it was believed he would get when he entered the race. On account of the overwhelming sentiment for municipal ownership, Mr. Stone could hardly be considered a factor in the race during the latter part of the campaign. As there were only 174 votes cast in opposition to municipal ownership, to which Mr. Stone was openly opposed, that number was about the limit he could hope to receive. It was different in the contest between the candidates for police judge and treasurer. Both of these were in doubt until the last vote was counted. The big majority given Captain Stone by his friends in the First ward, where he lives, is what gave him the election. Nicholas' big vote in the Third decided the police judge contest, and caused the defeat of Leavitt.

THEY ALL DOT "T" AND CROSS "F" IN CONGRESS

WASHINGTON, May 2.—The queer popularity of the old expression "dotting an I and crossing a T" is growing every day in the House of Representatives. Minority Leader Mann started the fad. In declaring that a certain provision of the new rules made absolutely no change over the old ones, he declared it was "not altered by the crossing of a T nor the dotting of an I." This was the first extended speech made after the convening of the extra session. The expression stuck in the minds of the members. It has been used about three score times since. Rep. Underwood, (Dem. Ala.) and Rep. Cooper (Rep. Wis.) pulled it off in the reciprocity debate; Rep. Rucker (Dem. Mo.) got it off in connection with the debate on the bill for the direct election of senators. Speaker Cannon used it in his plea against Canadian reciprocity, and Rep. Fordney (Rep. Mich.) shouted it out the other day. The end is not yet. Things run in fads at the House. When somebody revives a catchy expression it has a long run until it becomes chatty than another member starts a new one.
