CLAN GATHERS TO INTER ITS DEAD

**O'HARA'S WANDERING IRISHMEN
ARE AGAIN NEAR THE NATION-
AL CAPITAL—STORY OF THE
CLAN AND ITS PEOPLE**

ATLANTA, Ga., May 5.—Beyond
the outskirts of the city where the
fortified hills look down upon the
Chattahoochee, a magic city has risen,
a city of tents and wagon tops. It
might be an army encampment were
it not that the tents are tattered and
battered and of many colors, and
filled to overflowing with laughing
children. The canvas-topped wagons
and the dogs, the ponies staked out
under a hundred trees, give the
magic city the appearance of one of
the caravans of the plains. That scene
is nearest right. It is the Atlanta
camp of the O'Hara, its nearest
approach to a "home."

The clan has been gathering for a
week, and on a strange mission. It
is its annual home coming to bury its
dead. And there are many this year,
an even dozen children and their
elders having passed away since last
May to the last camp ground. Some
died on the road in a far-off state;
some of the babies in their mother's
arms beneath the battered canvas of
the family wagon. And each, as soon
as the priest from the nearest town
had sped the departed soul, was sent
home to Atlanta to wait in a cemetery
until the coming of the clan.

"Gypses?" No! Neither old
Thomas O'Hara nor any of his kin-
men will accept the classification be-
stowed impartially upon all who live
upon the high road and sleep at the
inn of the Silver Moon. They are
Irish all, sturdy, black haired men of
the North of Ireland, and their wives
are as Irish as themselves. They may
have been born under the stars and
stripes—the younger of the clan—but
the North of Ireland brogue of their
fathers clings to their tongues, and
he still swears by their Irish saints.
The Clan O'Hara has been gather-
ing in Atlanta for its burial of the
dead for twenty years and more. Once
it was but a family of Irish horse
traders whose head died near the
growing town, and who was laid to
rest in Oakland cemetery. When the
first death was followed by another,
he, too, was laid in the O'Hara lot.
Then a woman of the clan followed
her husband, and a child or two was
added to the little group under Oak-
land's sod.

Then the O'Haras bought a larger
lot—a half acre of ground, and
avowed that never a member of the
clan should rest separated from his
fellows. The O'Haras are half a thou-
sand now, men, women and children,
and never a one is too far away when
spring transforms the Southern
woods to green to turn his caravan
toward Georgia and trade his way
back to the only reunion the clan
recognizes.

Promptly at noon the other day
the Clan O'Hara, 500 strong,
wended its way from the camp
near the river to the Church of the
Immaculate Conception. They did
not ride the horses of the camp nor
drive the buggies so plentiful among
them. They rode in carriages, for
every undertaker and liverman was
drawn upon, and they gave little ap-
pearance of being the Bohemian
strollers that they are. Suits of sober
black and gowns of finest silk were
there, with here and there a shawl
woven in old Ireland, and worth its
weight in silver.

Jeweled crucifixes and rosaries of
rare value were worn by the women,
and upon many a man's finger shone
a diamond worth his earnings for a
year. They are not poor, these
O'Haras, as the bankers of the South
will tell you. Though they are home-
less, they own land in large tracts;
though they sleep in tents, more than
one Atlanta building is leased from
the captain of the clan. Their two de-
cades of horse trading have been
profitable ones.

The services at the old Church of
the Immaculate Conception were as
impressive as half a score of priests
and acolytes could make them, a so-
lemn requiem for the dead and a
prayer for the living. The old church,
founded by Irish Catholics, and still
their favorite house of worship here,
has always been the scene of the
O'Hara funeral.

The names of the twelve who have
died in the past year were recited
and masses said for the soul of each.

They were Baby Michael, who died at
Madison, Ky., on May 16; Bridget
Sherlock, whose end came in Atlanta
last May; Patrick McNamara, who
passed at Montgomery, Ala., in Sep-
tember; Theo. Carroll, who breathed
his last on the road while the camp
was pitched in South Georgia; Jan.
O'Hara, killed under a train near
Bavannah two days before Christmas,
and six others, all young or old mem-
bers of the clan, and all equally hon-
ored at the end.

From the old church the funeral
passed on to the cemetery, where suc-
ceeding years have crowded the
graves of anti-bellum Georgians until
there is scarce stepping room between
them. But toward a corner of the
land, on a sunlit hillside, the plot of
the Clan O'Hara, stretches down to
ward the valley, and there is room for
many a wanderer yet to lie down in
his last sleep. The twelve bodies
were taken from the O'Hara vault and
each interred separately in its grave.
The vault stands always ready to re-
ceive a member of the clan, but its
cold stone walls and mouldy crypts
are not for those who wander beneath
the stars and sleep where the rivers
sing.

It has always been the warm brown
earth for the O'Haras; out under the
open sky, with the spring grass for a
coverlet; the mating birds for choir-
leaders. There they sleep—a long line
of several generations now, and there
will their brothers and their sons
finally come to join them.

PORTLANDERS TO ATTEND ROSEBURG'S BIG AFFAIR

A committee of Roseburg business
men who went to Portland to "boost"
for the third annual strawberry festi-
val, to be held in Roseburg, have re-
turned. The members of the commit-
tee are much encouraged over their
visit to the metropolis, and predict
that several hundred Portland people
will visit Roseburg on Portland day.

The committee personally visited
every wholesale establishment in the
city. No less than 125 tickets were
pledged, thus assuring a special train
which will be operated under the di-
rection of General Passenger Agent
McMurray, who will accompany the
party. With 125 tickets sold, the com-
mittee believes that fully 300 Port-
land people will take advantage of
the special train, and at the same time
enjoy the festivities. The committee
are loud in their praise of the treat-
ment accorded them by the citizens
of Portland. The Portland Commem-
orial Club was thrown open to the vi-
sitors, and a committee of Portland
gentlemen was appointed to assist the
Roseburg men in their travels about
the city.—Umpqua Valley News.

ROSEBURG IS ASSURED OF GAS FOR RESIDENTS

ROSEBURG, May 5.—The W. F.
Boardman company of San Francisco,
who were recently awarded a gas
franchise in Roseburg, have filed with
the city recorder a certified check for
\$5,000, as a guarantee of fulfilling
their agreement to install in this city
a gas system costing \$50,000. Having
already secured a site for this gas
plant it is expected that they will be-
gin active operations thereon at a very
early date. The plant is to be in op-
eration within eight months.
