**BIG A. A. U. TRACK
 MEET THIS SEASON**

ONE OF THE LARGEST EVER
 SEEN ON THE COAST WILL BE
 PULLED OFF IN AUGUST AT
 THE ASTOR CENTENNIAL

ASTORIA, May 6.—What promise
 to be the greatest track meet ever
 held under the auspices of the Pacific
 Northwest Association of the Amateur
 Athletic Union is billed for the Astoria
 Centennial celebration, when the an-
 nual championships are decided dur-
 ing the last week in August, most
 likely August 26th. At least fifty of
 the best athletes in the Northwest
 will be present from the various clubs,
 while a relay race open to every high
 school in the state is planned by the
 Centennial Athletic committee, a
 handsome silver cup being given as
 the prize. Gold and silver medals
 will be allotted the winners in the
 various field and track events in the
 amateur championships.

T. Morris Dunne, secretary of the
 P. N. A., who resides in Portland, is
 doing much to help along the centen-
 nial meet. Originally it was planned
 to hold the annual athletic champion-
 ships on Multnomah field in Portland,
 but that was found impracticable on
 account of the recent fire, which de-
 stroyed the club house and grand-
 stand. Multnomah very generously
 turned the meeting over to the As-
 toria Amateur Athletic Club, which
 will be responsible for it success this
 year. Secretary A. Guillemme of the
 Astoria Club is co-operating with Mr.
 Dunne in securing the best athletes
 in the Northwest to attend.

The Seattle Athletic Club, accord-
 ing to Captain Bralley Glish, is pre-
 paring to send a team of eight men to
 the national championships at Pitts-
 burg in June, and will return this
 team to Astoria intact for the August
 meeting. Glish informed Mr. Dunne
 that Seattle would help make the As-
 toria celebration famous.

The Spokane Athletic Club will
 send a team of from eight to twelve
 men, and the Vancouver, B. C. Ath-
 letic Club will be represented by its
 famous all-round athlete, Gills, and
 a team of its best men. Gills com-
 peted against the world champion,
 Martin Sheridan of New York, and
 was barely beaten out. He alone will
 be a big drawing card.

The Multnomah Amateur Athletic
 Club will send a full team, and in
 addition to Dan Kelley, holder of the
 world's 100 and 200 yard champion-
 ships in the sprints and a broad jump-
 er who represented America at the
 London Olympic games in 1908, will
 also secure the attendance of the
 world famous Forrest Smithson, the
 only man who ever topped the 120
 yard hurdles in less than 15 seconds.
 Captain Jack Hickson of the Multnomah
 Club is already assured of Kelley
 in the broad jump, and feels rea-
 sonably sure that he can induce
 Smithson, who is now in California,
 to return and run for the club in the
 hurdles.

The high school relay promises to
 be a big hit with a four man team
 from each high school in the state.
 Athletics in the various high schools
 has grown wonderfully in the past
 five years, and there is not a school of
 any pretension in the Northwest that
 does not boast of a school track team.
 Each year the big colleges, the State
 University at Eugene and the Oregon
 Agricultural College at Corvallis,
 sponsor meets at which the state
 championships are held for high
 school boys, paying the expenses of a
 six man team. This has fostered an
 athletic spirit such as no other thing
 is capable of doing, and when the
 crowds gather in the old baseball
 grounds in Astoria, which have been
 made over into an up-to-date athletic
 field, they will witness the best efforts
 of the best type of Oregon boy.

While the date has not been defi-
 nitely arranged, it is very likely that
 August 26th, which falls on Saturday,
 will be finally selected.
