UNCLE SAM WON'T HONOR OLD CONTINENTAL NOTES

WASHINGTON, May 6.—A \$40 note authorized by the Continental Congress was sent to the treasury by a man who asked real money for it. He was told it was worthless. Specimens of continental money come in from time to time. None of those issues were ever redeemable by the United States as reorganized under the constitution. Between 1790 and 1797 the treasury did pay one dollar in specie for one hundred in continental currency. The other notes have only a historic value now.

Born in Punksutawney, Penn., November 17, 1847. Died in Klamath Falls, Ore., April 29, 1911.

She was so uniformly cheerful, so utterly unselfish, and her sympathy was unbounded, extending far beyond the limits of her own church and class.

Her own experience from early childhood had prepared her to comprehend and sympathize with the sufferings and struggles of others.

She became convinced that the only earthly salvation for the whole human race lay in the abolition of wage slavery, and possessing the courage of her convictions, did all that lay in her power for the advancement of the cause of socialism.

Whatever her hands found to do, that she did with all her might;

therefore, being a member of the Catholic church, she fulfilled her religious duties as she conceived them, with ardent zeal.

A faithful and loving wife, unselfishly devoted to her children and their families, her place can never be filled.

She leaves the companion of her life for over thirty-five years; a daughter, Mrs. Margaret Whitton of Medford; two sons, August Day of Medford and Joseph Day of Klamath Falls; a number of grandchildren and a great number of friends and acquaintances to deplore her passing.

If real merit and unselfishness were justly rewarded there would be no more imposing monument erected in the cemetery of Klamath Falls than that which will cover the remains of Mary Elizabeth Day. E. S. H.
