THE MELROSE COMPANY HERE FOR THREE WEEKS

Theater goers of this city are pleased, very pleased to learn that the popular Melrose company of players, are coming back again. The ladies of the company are happily cast. Genevieve Cunningham has the part of the financier's daughter, with whom the hero is in love and who is his guiding star through his troublous administration. Miss Melrose is cast for the mother of the hero and has, a most effective scene where she counsels her son to do what is right, even though it involves the good name of his father.

The other members of the company with several additions give good support. There will be a change of play each night.

CIVIL SERVICE EXAMINATION

(Clock)
An examination for clerk will be held at the postoffice in this city on June 3, 1911.

Age limit, 18 to 45 years, on the date of examination.

Married women will not be admitted to the examination. This prohibition, however, does not apply to women who are divorced or those who are separated from their husbands and support themselves, but they are eligible for appointment only as clerk.

Applicants must be physically sound, and male applicants must be not less than 5 feet 4 inches in height without boots or shoes, and weigh not less than 125 pounds without overcoat or hat.
