to say, might in time be worth mil-
lions to the owner and operator.
Since this land has been advertised

for sale inquiries from various
sources have been made as to its
probable value, and the probabilities
are that several parties may bid on it
if the appraisal is not too high.
Among those looking up the matter
are the city officials, who regard the
water right as of vast importance and
value to the city, as affording an op-
portunity for securing power for own-
ing and operating an electric light
plant, and, possibly, a street car sys-

tem. On being interviewed on the sub-
ject Mayor Sanderson was free to ad-
mit that he had "been thinking about
it." "The trouble is," however, said
he, "the city has no money to buy it
with. If some one would agree to bid
it in and afterwards turn it over to
the city, after the people had voted
bonds with which to pay for it, I
am looking for such a man now," was
his parting shot.

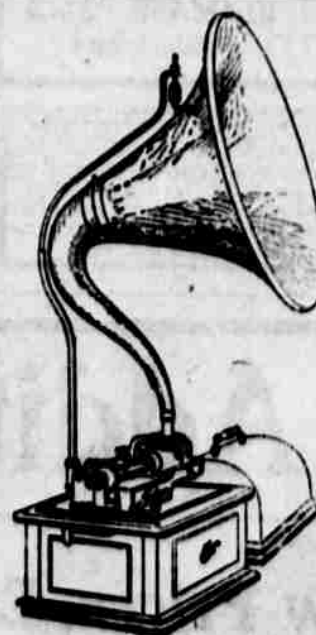
