FORTUNES HELD BY GOVERNMENT

\$3,000,000 IN GOLD WHICH THE
AUTHORITIES ARE UNABLE TO
INDUCE THE OWNERS TO AC-
CEPT FROM THEM

WASHINGTON, May 10.—Stacked
in one of the corners of the steel-
ribbed vaults of the United States
treasury \$3,000,000 in gold coin is
going begging. The government can
not give it away; none of the right-
ful owners can be induced to take it.
It represents unclaimed interest on
the public debt. Somewhere in the
nooks and crannies and out of the
way places are the government's in-
terest checks for the money, which
have never been cashed. Some of
them never will be presented, others
may be brought around in time, and
some are being held by cautious in-
vestors.

From time to time the treasury at-
tempts to call in the checks, and the
vagaries of human nature are shown.
One citizen has more than \$60,000
waiting for him, and holds the checks
for it. He was recently invited to
cash in, and made a trip to Washing-
ton to tell the treasury officials that
the checks were his property—he
would cash them when he pleased, or
burn them up if he wished. If he
does the latter his money will be held
in the vaults until congress, perhaps,
might dispose of it. The treasury
can do nothing but keep it.

The contractor who laid the first
pavement upon Pennsylvania avenue
from the Capitol to the White House,
has \$21,000 waiting for him; it has
been there many years, but the treas-
ury has never been able to find the
rightful owner, as the contractor
failed and his affairs became involved
in litigation, which has never been
settled.

The amounts of this seemingly own-
erless fund range from thousands
down to a few cents. The smaller
amounts are all held for those who
owned government securities at some
time or other, and probably have for-
gotten to collect their latest interest.

THEY DON'T FOLLOW THE OLD CUSTOM

WASHINGTON, May 10.—Senate
custom has always decreed that com-
mittees should be located in certain
rooms, and that new chairmen should
go to them. But custom is side-
tracked this session by a number of
chairmen who have been promoted.
Chairman Penrose of the postoffice
committee has moved the goods and
chattels of Aldrich's finance commit-
tee to the postoffice committee rooms
on the ground floor of the Capitol.
The new postoffice committee will oc-
cupy the former quarters of the
finance committee. Clapp of Minne-
sota, chairman of Indian affairs, was
glad to exchange his position for the
important chairmanship of interstate
commerce, but he has removed the
latter to his present quarters. War-
ren of Wyoming, long chairman of
military affairs, was given the big
committee on appropriations, but he
keeps his old rooms on the ground
floor, and stuff by the truck load is
being taken from the ancient quar-

ters of the appropriations committee
upstairs to the Warren reservation.
Warren has two fine rooms, but he
has obtained also the adjoining mag-
nificently frescoed apartment hereto-
fore occupied by Senator Lodge as
chairman of immigration, and has
taken possession of former Speaker
Hale's select rooms in the Capitol.
