THE IRRIGATION PROJECTS IN U.S.

AN RECLAMATION SERVICE OFFICIAL GIVES STATEMENT REGARDING THE EXTENT OF THE WORK ACCOMPLISHED

WASHINGTON, May 13.—A graphic statement of the vast extent of the government's irrigation projects and the success that attends their operation was made today by C. J. Blanchard, statistician of the Reclamation Service, who has returned from a tour of inspection.

"At the present time there are twenty-eight projects in various stages of construction," said Blanchard. "The total acreage involved in these projects is 3,200,000 which will provide homes for approximately 320,000 persons on farms, and an equal number in cities, towns, and villages within this area or in the neighborhood thereof, or a total of 640,000 people. The total area now under water is 1,000,000 acres, on which have been established approximately 14,000 families and an equal number have taken up their homes in the cities, towns, and villages.

"The progress of the engineers has been rapid, notwithstanding isolated location of the principal engineering works from transportation and the many difficulties which have been encountered in the promotion of the work. Up to the present time the canal systems constructed have a total length of 5,621 miles. Many of these canals carry whole rivers. Placed end to end they would reach from New York to San Francisco and back to New Orleans. Tunnels having a total length of 16 miles have been excavated, mostly through mountains. The excavation of rock and earth amount to the enormous total of 50,000,000 cubic yards, or more than one-third of the yardage required for the Panama Canal. Owing to the location of some of the principal works in regions heretofore inaccessible, the Reclamation Service has been compelled to construct 575 miles of wagon roads, some of which are in the most rugged country on this continent. The Service has in operation 1,500 miles of telephone lines.

"At present the government farms are limited to five projects, and include only 366 farm units. The field forces are pushing forward the work of extension of canals in order to make ready for settlers a large area of new lands, some of which will probably be opened in the fall.

INLAND HERALD LOSES GREAT DEAL OF MONEY

SPOKANE, May 13.—The Inland Herald, the afternoon publication which has been operated in Spokane for more than a year at great financial loss has announced that publication has ceased.

An editorial statement published says: "All claims against the company will be settled promptly. "The step has been deemed advisable by the company on account of the indifferent attitude shown by those who were formerly loudest in their insistence upon the crying need of this city for another evening paper under independent management."

In the 15 months that have elapsed since the paper first appeared under the guidance of Allen Haynes, it is said its backers have lost approximately \$600,000.

At the receivership proceedings in January it was brought out that Allen Haynes had no money invested in the paper. Barney O'Neil, of Wallace, recent aspirant for the Republican nomination as Governor of Idaho, and F. B. Gregg, proprietor of the Quick Print Shop, have been the heaviest losers.
