MASKED CARNIVAL FOR THE ROSE FESTIVAL

Special to The Herald. PORTLAND, May 22.—Masked revelry will prevail at the coming Portland Rose Festival. At least one night will be given over to fun and frolic in which masked merry-makers may disport to their hearts' content. Section of Sixth and Seventh streets will be set apart for these festivities, and at alternate street intersections bands will be stationed to add to the attractiveness of the occasion. The streets will be specially decorated and illuminated so that with the gaily dressed masqueraders the scene will resemble fairyland.

Secret and fraternal orders of the city are expected to take an interest in this feature of the Festival, and they may appear wearing the insignia of their lodges. One such organization promises to appear in trappings of old feudal days. Other societies will put on burlesque stunts or special drills and dances.

The public generally, however, may join in these exercises that will be dedicated to Momus, the presiding deity of the mask, and to Comus, god of revels. Women of the city may appear in gay festal garb, which is one of the attractive features of floral carnivals abroad.

WEATHER MAN SAYS APRIL WAS COLDEST YET

Special to The Herald. OREGON AGRICULTURAL COLLEGE, Corvallis, May 22.—"The month just past is the coldest April on record," says W. L. Powers, weather observer at the Oregon Agricultural college, in a report just issued.

"The nearest approach to it was in 1903, when the monthly mean temperature was 1.2 degrees higher. The mercury dropped below freezing nine times during the last month. In previous years it has not fallen below the freezing point more than three times. The minimum, 25 degrees, is 3 degrees colder than any in the past thirteen years.

"At 6:30 p. m. on the 12th the dew point, as determined by the wet and dry bulb readings, was 32 degrees, and the hard freeze the morning of the 13th was not unexpected. Frost may be expected when the dew point is found to be within 5 degrees of freezing at 6:30 p. m., and the other conditions are favorable to frost. Seven degrees below freezing is about the extreme amount that might be combatted by smokes, but it is possible that damage might have been prevented in some cases had smokes been used.

"Peaches are reported to have suffered most, while cherries and other fruits were injured in certain localities.

"The total precipitation for the month was 3 inches, a departure from the normal of .15 inch. The greatest

rainfall in any twenty-four hours was 1.95 inches. The deficiency in the normal rainfall for the year to date is 3.92 inches. The snow which fell was the only April shower in the past thirteen years.

"There were thirteen clear days, six partly cloudy, eleven cloudy days and nine days on which the precipitation was .91 inch, while the prevailing winds of the month were south-west.

"The monthly mean temperature was 46.5 degrees, a departure from normal of 3.6 degrees. The highest temperature was 80 degrees, on April 23d, and the lowest 25 degrees, on the 13th. The greatest daily range was 45 degrees on the 23d. The dates of heavy frost were April 2, 6, 12, 13 and 14."
