BEWARE OF FAKE TREE DOCTORS; THEY'RE AROUND

COVALLIE, May 20.—Frauds are
being perpetrated in several parts of
the state by men who give as their
references the names of professors at
the state agricultural college, with-
out authority. One claims preposter-
ous things in the way of curing apple
trees of anthracnose and protecting
them from the codling moth by apply-
ing chemicals to the roots. Another
is offering a premium with subscrip-
tions to a paper, which turns out to
be a fake.

Dean A. B. Cordley of the Agricul-
tural school, has received a letter
from a farmer near Tuolumne, asking
if he gave his endorsement to such
men. The letter says:

"A man named Saunders claims to
have a treatment whereby he renders
trees immune from diseases by the
application of some chemicals to the
roots, especially apple trees. He
claims that they will be cured of an-
thrachnose, and that the codling
moth will not bother such trees for
six years, and that no spraying is re-
quired on treated trees other than a
light spray of concentrated lye once
every two or three years, to keep
moses off the trees. Mr. Saunders
gave me the name of Prof. Cordley
as reference, so I ask the college to
give me its opinion. I regard this
fellow as a fraud, pure and simple,
and in order to protect my neighbors
from his operations I have written to
the college."

"I know nothing whatever of him,"
Dean Cordley replied, "and if I
should give my testimony in the case
it would be to the effect that any man
who claims to be able to render trees
immune from the attacks of the cod-
ling moth, anthracnose and other
fungus diseases by an application of
certain chemicals to the roots of trees
is a fraud."

Another letter from Lebanon states
that a young man claiming to be con-
nected with the college is taking sub-
scriptions for a paper, and offering a
premium, which turned out later to
be a fraud. Dean Cordley has issued
a statement that he is evidently trad-
ing upon the popularity and reputa-
tion of the college to make a smooth
way for his fraud.

FINDS MONEY INTENDED AS A BOYHOOD PRESENT

PORTLAND, May 20.—When J. E.
Day of 456 Tenth street chanced re-
cently to open a book which his father
had given him many years ago, a
\$5 bill fluttered out from among the
leaves. Evidently it had been in-
tended as a surprise to the boy of
that day. The bill had been printed
August 1, 1853, and was one of the
old state bank notes, issued by the
Railroad bank of the Erie and Kal-
amasoo in Adrian, Mich. With a
quill pen the names of C. E. Heister,
cashier, and E. O. Hunston, presi-
dent had been signed on the note, and
the ink is now so faded as to be har-
dly discernible. It is printed on but
one side.

The intention of Mr. Day's father to
surprise his boy with a gift un-
expected has after all not been de-
feated, for after the lapse of years the
remembrance has increasing meaning,
and while not valuable as a circulat-
ing medium, the bill as a curiosity is
worth several times its face.

ALEX MARTIN SR. TO RETURN FOR A VISIT

The people of Klamath Falls will
soon have the pleasure of seeing Alex
Martin Sr. on the streets here again.
Mr. Martin left his home in Oakland,
Calif., a few days ago, and after a
short visit at Medford and Jackson-
ville he will come to this city for an
extended visit. He is expected to ar-
rive here probably Saturday evening.

Mr. Martin Sr. was one of the
strong financial and business men of
the early history of this section. He
is a man who is loved and respected
by all who have had dealings with
him, and it will be a real pleasure to
see him in the city again. In recent
years Mr. Martin has spent five or six
months of the year in this city, until
last year, when he was prevented
from visiting here on account of a
very serious illness. He has always
had the greatest faith in the future of
this city and county, and with his
heavy financial interests he has great-
ly aided in encouraging the develop-
ment and upbuilding of this country.
It will be with the keenest pride that
he will return here after only a few
years' absence, and see the village
that he left grown into a most cred-
itable and progressive city.

SPOKANE, Wash., May 20.—"Just

Eldon Beck, two and a half years old,
poured wood alcohol down the throat
of his nine-months-old sister. The
mother, Mrs. A. C. Beck, had left the
children in the kitchen while she was
in another part of the house, and
little Eldon, tiring of "minding the
baby," saw in the bottle a new diver-
sion. He seized it and gave the in-
fant a drink. The cries of the little
one brought the mother in haste, and
a call was sent for half a dozen doc-
tors. Soon antidotes had followed
the deadly drug down the throat of
the babe with such good results that
its recovery is expected.

SISTER OF MRS. TAFT MAY WED MAJOR BUTT

WASHINGTON, May 20.—Major
Archibald Butt, aide to President
Taft, is to marry the sister of Mrs.
Taft, according to the rumors now in
circulation in Washington. The state-
ment is now being made openly in of-
ficial circles that Major Butt is to wed
Mrs. Lucy Laughlin of Pittsburgh. The
announcement of the engagement is
expected soon.

Mrs. Laughlin's late husband, Thos.
K. Laughlin of Pittsburgh, killed him-
self March 11, 1910. Five days pre-
vious he had returned from an Euro-
pean trip and found his wife at the
White House instead of home.

STIMSON IS MENTIONED AS TAFT'S RUNNING MATE

WASHINGTON, May 20.—Henry
L. Stimson of New York is promi-
nently mentioned here as a possible run-
ning mate for President Taft in the
presidential campaign of 1912. Presi-
dent Taft expects to be renominated
and his friends who are casting about
for a man to head the ticket with
him, are said to favor Stimson, both
for geographical and personal rea-
sons.
