DISEASED SPUD CAUSES STUDY

O. A. C. EXPERTS ARE HUNTING CAUSE OF TROUBLES ENCOUNTERED IN THE NORTHERN POTATO FIELDS

CORVALLIS, Oct. 3.—H. P. Wilson and F. D. Bailey of the Oregon Agricultural college entomology and plant pathology departments have been studying the cause of brown and yellow spots in potato's grown in the fields about Toledo.

An appeal came from one of the big potato growers there for assistance. He had planted Irish Cobbler potatoes bought from a reputable house, and being short of seed had added two sacks from a neighbor, but failed to examine them for pests.

His first shipment brought a price much above the market, but two subsequent shipments were refused by the consignee because affected by yellow and brown spots.

This is a part of the work conducted throughout the state by the college crop pest experts, who are ready to aid all farmers troubled with crop diseases or insect pests.

ONE KING DYING; ANOTHER CRAZY

BAVARIAN THRONE MAY SOON BE EMPTY, AS INSANE RULER'S SUBSTITUTE IS VENERABLE AND MAY SOON PASS AWAY

MUNICH, Bavaria, Oct. 3.—Prince Leopold, the octogenarian prince regent of Bavaria, ruling in the place of "Mad King" Otto, is said to be nearing the end of his days.

Otto is confined in one of the fairy-like palaces planned and built by the architect-genius King Ludwig. Although mad as a March hare, he retains the title of "king" until he dies. Until then the occupants of the Bavarian throne will only have the title of "prince regent."

SOMETHING ABOUT ESPERANTO

One of the greatest problems confronting the present age is the selection of an international auxiliary language, simplest in construction, euphonic, easily learnable, which would answer to all the purposes of our complex modern life. The desire for an international language expressed already by the prophet Zephaniah and advocated by various scientists and philosophers including Bacon, Leibnitz, Descartes, etc., was materialized by Dr. Kamenhof, a Russian who published in 1887 his first essay upon the subject under the pseudonym "Dr. Esperanto."

Therefore, as neither dead nor living languages can serve as vehicle of expression, the former for their lack of words to express modern ideas and for their extreme difficulty, the latter for the jealousy which the adoption of some of the modern languages would awaken, it is only perfectly logical that the only acceptable language is an artificial one as Esperanto. At present there are over 1,100 Esperanto clubs with over a million of adherents, publishing 72 journals and having over 3,000 of original and translated words. There are different associations using Esperanto, The International Pacific Association, Red Cross, etc. A congress will be held in 1915 in San Francisco, Cal., which judged by the previous ones will be attended by several thousand of participants.

In all probability some will visit Southern Oregon, shall we let the honors pass to other towns for entertaining those distinguished foreign guests. With the opening of Panama canal Klamath Falls may become the most cosmopolitan city, shall we remain unprepared for the great event.
