The Herald extends congratulations to Mr. Murray, and wishes him success. He is an able newspaper man, with good business ability, and his long experience in the newspaper field in Klamath Falls should fit him to make a success with his new purchase.

Klamath Falls has three daily papers, which it looks as if would occupy the field for some time, at least. It is generally conceded that three papers is too great a burden on the business men of the city, and more than they can support, and the forthcoming struggle will probably be a case of the survival of the fittest.

MONARCHS OF ALL THEY SURVEY

AN EXCHANGE comments on the fact that with the recent appliances for convenience in household management no one should have trouble in keeping a cook.

The commentator goes on to tell what a convenience it is to have electricity harnessed so that the maid can turn a switch and start the coffee and cereals before getting out of bed. She could get these dishes ready before retiring for the night, the item says, and then simply inserts the plugs in the electric dishes ready for turning the switch next morning.

Then just about the time the aforesaid Abigail was dressed, ready for her official entry into the culinary chamber preparatory to her personal ministrations over the preparation of the food, the stuff already started to cook would be well under way, and there would be no trouble nor delay to agitate the nerves of Her Royal Highness.

The Herald, while not posing as an expert in matters relative to the best way of organizing and developing a nurture which will be acceptable to the sensitive organizations which usually constitute cooks and housemaids, ventures to predict that electricity will not solve the problem.

The average maid is boss. She is the queen and wielder of the large and cumbersome club made famous by an oftetime president. Any endeavor to harness her to reason by soft and soothing terms and privileges will result in her acceptance of the course of treatment without any great objection. But it will simply result in her doing as she pleases.

The servant girl question and those of woman suffrage and capital and labor, and a few others, are in our hands to make life interesting and full of variety. They are not to be solved at once. They are forced on us to give us something to think about, ponder on and plan over.

The ways of the servant girl are often beyond human understanding and lead folks sometimes to wonder if the movements and caprices of this uncertain class of assistance are not governed by some power occult. Even students of human nature of long and varied experience will admit that the fathoming of the ways of the servant

girl is as tough a knot to saw through as is to be found.

In order to jolly the younger generation of servant girls, wealthy, or, at least, comfortably well off, housewives in New York occasionally give banquets in honor of their old and faithful servants, having a feast at which the long time household help are guests while the women who usually boss are at the same time transformed into cooks and waitresses, winding up the doings with medals, decorations, engrossed resolutions for Cook to hang up over the bed, or presents of gold coin—unless checks be more convenient.

The Herald has heard of women who have been so anxious to get a servant that they would engage more than one for the same time of commencing service, to be sure that at least one would be on deck. One instance of this kind is related by a woman with a large family who had great difficulty in keeping a presiding officer in charge of the cuisine, so finally got desperate and hired five to come the next morning, the quintet having called on her to apply in response to an advertisement.

She then spent a sleepless night wondering what she would do in the morning, as she felt certain all would appear. It was not so to be. Not one came. She figured it out that all of them had gone to more than one place, hiring out as fast as they could, and then sitting up the best one of the places they had "accepted," and showing up there next day. They were just as clever at their game as she was, and more so. She was unable to beat them "to it."

It will take time to solve the servant girl problem, more time than some of us have to spare, in fact.
