The Single Tax Will Not Be Experimented With in Oregon

One of the many reasons why the State of Oregon yet for many years to come will continue to have a great influx of reliable people and stable capital is because her ship of state on her legislative journey has already passed the most dangerous breakers, and is now sailing placidly on the deep, but rather flowing current of the common human intelligence. And there is no longer any danger that any rash reform scheme, as, for example, the Henry George single tax scheme, will be experimented with here.

As this state has vested her legislative power more directly and evenly in the whole people of the community concerned than most of the states have done up to the present time, it follows that whatever reform scheme being advocated here must measure up to the composite of the will and intelligence of all the citizens in such communities. In order to stand any show of enactment.

Now, the sum and substance of the single tax system is simply to levy taxes on ground value, and to exempt all other values from taxation. The contention is that such a scheme would be a stimulant to industries, that it would induce people with capital into such communities to invest their capital in houses and other kinds of improvements to escape paying more taxes than the ordinary farmer or the holder of a vacant lot, as under this system a millionaire would need pay no greater amount than the owner of a vacant lot, provided he did not invest his capital in vacant land, but in houses, shops, stores, restaurants, hotels and machinery.

In its essence it is a most unequal method of exacting taxes, taking no cognizance of the natural fact that those who are able and strong, can with ease carry greater burdens than those who are lean and weak. It ignores one of the most beautiful phases we see in life when an older and an able brother or sister undertakes to carry a greater burden than a younger and weaker. But it caters to the secular idea of many people that to pay taxes is to pay out money and not get anything in return. They seem to think that there is absolutely no compensation for what we pay in taxes. There certainly must be a reason for this, the most irrational of ideas. There must in the past have been some serious misuse of the money exacted as taxes, creating

spores of distrust which still are alive in the people's mind. But we should now evolved to such a state of consciousness that we can distinguish the misuse of the purpose from the real purpose, and we should regard taxes as our common contribution to keep up a state of civilization amongst mankind. And everyone who believes in such a state should consider it an honor to contribute his proper share, according to his ability.

It is argued by the adherents of the single tax system that "it will break up land monopoly and distribute the soil more equally to those who are longing for a home of their own." But the irrefutable fact remains that such a system, if enacted, would work the opposite way, and all those who today are exerting their very utmost to pay off interest and installments on their farms and homes would get a few more centigrams added to their burden—centigrams which, by rights, should rest on the shoulders of those who inherit and have inherited wealth accumulated by past and passing generations.

And as the years would roll along under this system—the burden bearer would drop exhausted by the wayside, and their belongings revert to the coffers of the rich.

Such would be the consequence of such a system wherever it had had its sway for any length of time. How could, for instance, one who buys a vacant lot on the installment plan, hold his own against his rich neighbor, who may have thousands or maybe millions of dollars worth of wealth wherewith to make improvements and run his business if he was compelled to pay the same amount of taxes as his rich neighbor, or even a larger amount, as some of the single taxers prescribe? No, the idea is absurd. I doubt not that Henry George had a great heart that was beating for humanity. But as far as substantial reforms concerns, his brain was rather unreliable.

We have always serious minded faddists amongst us who, by their hobbies and zeal may sway kings and caesars, governors, councils and legislatures to adopt measures of doubtful merits. But when the supreme authority, the last say in the matter, is vested in the totality of the intelligence of men in all vocations of life—then only such kernels which stand the test of all these intellectual sifters combined will be implanted in our statutes.

And therefore we can feel assured that the burden of taxes will not be shifted from the shoulders of millionaires and owners of great wealth and put on the shoulders of homesteaders and home builders and cultivators of the soil, who generally have but smaller amounts of capital wherewith to improve their holdings.

But everybody will be compelled to pay his proper share, and will be induced to proclaim his proper say, according to his best understanding, and shoulder his share of responsibility, thus ballasting the ship of state and steady it against the storm of improper actions.

Even if our supreme court should decide against the Oregon system of direct legislation, the people of Oregon have already got a touch of enlightenment that will not be quenched even then. But still be able to prevent too much foolish legislation.
