HAMMER FOR MORE RAILROADS

IF ANYONE wishes to sit still and twiddle their thumbs until the Hill or Harriman lines get ready to volunteer their money and energy to string Klamath Falls to the big vine, let them wait, and maybe they will wait until their beards are like Rip Van Winkle's, ripe for the cutting.

Railroad enterprises do not advertise for opportunities. They do not have to, for there is plenty of pressure brought to bear on them by needy communities, who are willing to co-operate to get new laid rails without their searching the highways and hedges for places to locate new extensions.

What this community needs to do is to have sufficient organization, with enough steam behind it, to go after something with the courage of its convictions to back it up, to get it. A little company of hustlers took the long trip to Bend to see the railroad opened some days ago, and a faithful trio of local expansionists journeyed all the way to Burns to see what would be done at the meeting of the Central Oregon Development League.

But what did Lakeview, with no railroad to her city yet, do for the Burns meet?

She sent twenty people, and captured the convention next year.

Organization did that—or esprit de corps, as the French say. Lakeview is getting a railroad from below, and maybe she'll get one from the upper part of the state soon, if someone is not careful.

That someone is Klamath Falls, and the sooner the citizens get onto the fact and some decided action is taken, and a straight, clean cut campaign is planned, the sooner this city will get that to which it is rightfully entitled.

But it must ask for it, and make the request in such shape and with enough ammunition to shoot to show that it will meet the railroad half way.

PANAMA EXPO TO HAVE CEREMONY

PRESIDENT TAFT, NORDICA AND PROMINENT MEN TO PARTICIPATE IN CELEBRATION WHICH MARKS BREAKING OF GROUND.

SAN FRANCISCO, Oct. 14.—Special rates offered by the railroads and steamship companies induced thousands to journey from all parts of California and adjoining states to attend the ground breaking exercises for the Panama-Pacific International Exposition of 1915, to be held in San Francisco today.

President Taft's participation in the ceremonies, the presence of the Pacific fleet in San Francisco Bay, and singing by Madam Lillian Nordica, are a few of the attractions that crowded the Exposition City this week. San Francisco has more than 1300 first class hotels to accommodate the visitors. It is believed that the festivities which will conclude Sunday will surpass in interest the great Portland celebration of two years ago.

The committee on parade and ceremonies at the ground-breaking, of which Chas. de Young is chairman, has completed the order of exercises at the stadium.

There will be music by Cassara's Band, singing by the Pacific Saengerbund Society, the rendering of an Aria by Madam Nordica and the singing of the "Star Spangled Banner" by the audience, the Pacific Saengerbund Society, accompanied by all bands present at the stadium and all led by Madam Lillian Nordica. Addresses will be delivered by Chas. C. Moore, President of the Panama-Pacific International Exposition, Mayor P. H. McCarthy, Governor Hiram W. Johnson and President William H. Taft.

President Taft will use a handsome spade for turning over the first spadeful to earth. The spade was donated by Geo. Lewis of Shreve & Company and is solid silver with redwood handle chased in silver.

The parade will consist of police on foot, a platoon of mounted police, escort of two troops First Cavalry U. S. A., to President Taft. The chief executive of the Nation will be followed by the Directors of the Panama-Pacific International Exposition.
