THE SEVENTH SALOON LICENSE

ANOTHER saloon license has been granted in this city, making seven all told.

Whether the city has the 6,501 population necessary to make it right to grant a seventh license does not appear.

According to the much criticized charter there shall be in Klamath Falls not more than one saloon to each 1,000 population or major fraction thereof.

Thus, in order to grant the White Pelican bar a license through James H. Driscoll, the number of people in this city should be 6,501.

If anybody can prove that this city has that number of people it would be a pleasure to have such proof for the public.

While it would seem to be necessary, under the circumstances, for some ancient demonstration of the amplitude of the city to be furnished to the council in order that it be enabled to act intelligently, justly and legally on the proposition, it is evident that the council's members are not greatly interested in that part of the matter, which, by the way, is by some folks considered a vital part.

It is easy to assume that the city has any certain amount of population if the one assuming has no regard for the facts. There is some pleasure in a loyal citizen being able to use the granting of a license to a seventh saloon as an argument that the city is growing rapidly, and has reached over 6,500 population without knowing that he is arguing on a premise which is mere supposition, or a conclusion drawn from nothing but the purest imagination.

It is a pretty safe proposition to take that there are not 6,501 people living in Klamath Falls. It is the position that the council should take before granting a license to a seventh saloon, but apparently the right thing was distasteful to the council in this instance, and was therefore kept in the background. It was a bogie at which the city fathers shuddered, and they turned their back upon it.

Maybe the councilmen figured that as the legality of the city charter has been attacked a number of times that it was not a lawful and binding charter, and that, therefore, they need pay no attention to it. It is very easy to say that the charter is lawful if you want to act under it, and just as free of difficulty to say that it is "no good," and you can do as you please, if you do not like the provisions of it as they apply to the matter in hand.

Laying aside the question whether the council can by the affirmative votes of only five members make any proposition binding, in this instance there seems to have been a tendency to discriminate.

Only yesterday the oldest hotel in the city marked the probable close of its existence by an auction sale of its furnishings.

This is the Lakeside Inn, the building being owned by the Linkville Hotel company, in which Evan R. Reames, Alex Martin Sr. and Charles E. Moore are the principal stockholders. One of the principal reasons that this hotel has quit is because of the difficulty that has been in the way of its getting a license.

Mrs. M. McMillan, its proprietress, had wished to retire from business the first of the year, but in order to give the landed company a chance to either sell or lease the property, she stayed in possession and continued business.

The company was unable to sell or lease because there was no chance of getting a license. So the occupant of

the property has given up business, sold out, and the building is virtually empty, with many people strongly of the belief that it will never again be used for the purpose of a hotel.

It seems to have stood no show whatever of getting a license, but the White Pelican Hotel company had absolutely no difficulty. The argument which had weight against any bar for the old Lakeside Inn, lack of sufficient population, had no terrors for the council when came up the question of the new White Pelican hotel. Sometimes it depends on whose ox is gored.
