MORE PEOPLE FOR KLAMATH

EVERY time a newcomer reaches Klamath Falls and stays here it is a benefit to everybody.

The community at large has an asset in each settler.

The growth of the neighborhood is of vital importance to everybody in it. Merchants, lawyers, doctors, engineers, real estate men—not to forget the undertaker—are all interested in the growth of the city. There is not a class of professional or business men or artisans who are not vitally concerned with everything that augurs for expansion, and the chap who does not welcome the newcomer is not a loyal citizen.

Growth is a thing to be proud of, and the material gain that results therefrom is by no means a small part of the importance of growth.

If you shun the stranger and feel that he is poaching on your preserves that's just where you're wrong, for the advent of the settler is the thing that has made Klamath territory the attraction that it is, and is just exactly what will continue to make it.

When you read the raise in valuation of the property of Klamath county as prepared by the county assessor you may, if not a taxpayer, think it has nothing in particular in meaning for you.

If you are a taxpayer, maybe your first thought is that it is merely a repetition of the annual burden with which you are confronted.

If there were no growth of population or business there would be no raise in valuation and no increasing expenses of government to meet. If there were no expansion of the county and no consequent business nobody would have more taxes to pay. Nor would their property be worth any more than it was before.

He who has no property to pay taxes on is nevertheless benefitted by the expansion, for it gives him a better market for his labor, or whatever pursuit he is engaged in.

One of the greatest annual boosters that the West gets has just been made by the railroads from the Central or Middle West, but whether Klamath got her share of the advantage is not known, although it is decidedly doubtful. What is referred to is the annual fall colonist rate made by railroads from Chicago, St. Louis, Kansas City, Omaha, the Twin Cities and other points at an approximate distance from the coast. From Chicago is made a rate of \$32 to coast points, and it brings thousands of people who come out intending to stay. On this rate a person can get as far as Weed, certainly, but whether to Klamath Falls the Herald is not informed.

At any rate the fare at the fall colonist period is cheap enough for anybody, and a lot of people could be brought in to settle here if they were made to know the advantages of the Klamath Basin. Lots of them come West heading for Portland or Eugene, some other well advertised point on the main line, where land is not to be had nearly as cheap as hereabouts.

If this city were to have an office established in the East as well as at main Western terminals during the low rate period to act in securing new comers to this district it would pay very handsome returns. It takes some advertising and some expense, true, but would help to build up the community rapidly.

If such an undertaking cost \$10,000, and brought 1,000 people here it would be a great investment. But it would not cost half that, nor one-

fourth, and very likely would divert that much of the westward travelers hunting a settled point, to come into Klamath county.

In order to gain settlers it would even pay this section to stand the railroad fares to bring them here, or at least to refund them fares if they did not stay, not to mention the expense of probably two or three dollars a head under the plan which is proposed above.

There will be another homeseekers' low rate on for a month in the spring, and it would be a fine thing if Klamath county could get the fair share of the immigration to which she is entitled by her superior resources and ample room for all.

The way to accomplish anything like this is to get busy.
