

LYMAN REACHED SAN FRANCISCO

HIS BRIBE TO PORTLAND JAILER CAUSED HIM TO BE DEPRIVED OF CLOTHES SAVE HIS BRILLIANT UNDERWEAR

Dr. John Grant Lyman arrived at San Francisco yesterday in charge of Deputy United States Marshal Frank Beatty to face trial before the United States court.

While in Portland Lyman was in a temporary jail, and turned to his old habit of trying to bribe his keeper. He offered the night jailer, David Fuller, \$2,500 to free him, to be paid immediately upon his being let out of prison, and agreed to send Fuller \$1,000 more if Lyman reached Vancouver, B. C. in safety.

When United States Marshal Leslie M. Scott heard this he had the medical man removed to a steel cage, where not only his crutches were taken away from him, but he was also deprived of his outer clothing, as well as blankets and bedding he had been allowed.

Lyman refused to use the meager allowance of bedding which was tendered him, and in understood to have slept his last night in Portland simply in his famous baby blue underwear.

Even his lavender pajamas were separated from their owner.
