SEEKING THE LIGHT

WHAT ordinances may be neces-
 sary to hold a special elec-
 tion at which the freeholders and
 other franchised voters of the city of
 Klamath Falls may vote for or against
 an issue of bonds to take up the
 floating debt of the city, which now
 drifts hither and yon in the form of
 woefully depreciated warrants, have
 been ordered by the city council to be
 drawn up by the city attorney, E. L.
 Elliott. This was determined upon
 by the council last night on motion
 of Councilman G. W. White.

It is a sensible move.
 It is the remedy which was advocat-
 ed by the Herald before the subject
 was ever brought up in a council
 meeting.

The finance committee made a re-
 port showing that dealers had added
 a premium of 10 per cent to prices at
 which goods were furnished to other
 people, which was—although not stat-
 ed by the report—tacked on simply to
 help cover the discount at which war-
 rants stand.

This 10 per cent, plus the 6 per
 cent drawn by the warrants, would
 offset the discount completely.

This fact was pointed out by the
 Herald before the council took official
 cognizance of it.

That the city has been losing heav-
 ily by the way the finances have been
 handled is a conclusion of the finance
 committee of the council, reached af-
 ter the Herald had called attention of
 the public to the condition.

While it may be said that it would
 have been better for the bond issue
 to be made a little greater than the
 floating debt, in order to give the
 city a surplus to work with, yet such
 a move might lead to expenditures a
 little faster than the city would make
 them if there was not a surplus on
 hand. With the pace at which the
 city has lately been making improve-
 ments and piling up debts for the
 taxpayers to pay eventually, it is just
 as well not to let out too much slack
 rein.

It is to be hoped that the proposed
 bond issue will carry without a dis-
 senting vote and by a heavy declara-
 tion of the people. It means to per-
 cent or maybe 4 per cent on a debt that
 is now costing from 10 to 25 per cent,
 and which will continue to grow more
 burdensome if not checked.

The issuance of the bonds will cut
 the interest as indicated, and will
 also give the city a better credit and
 establish it in the confidence of those
 who have been looking askance at its
 business methods. Merchants will be
 willing to offer it their wares at the
 same prices as other people get them.

SENATOR BOURNE'S YARDSTICK

SENATOR BOURNE of Oregon is
 to be congratulated on the spirit
 of the statement given out by him as
 the president of the National Pro-
 gressive League. The senator recog-
 nizes that business is retarded, con-
 fused and injured by the uncertainty
 that prevails as to the application of
 existing law to the operations of busi-
 ness combinations. He sees that the
 courts are having no end of trouble
 in arranging the terms on which the
 law shall be applied in specific cases
 and that the prospect of getting at
 any general principle that shall be
 clear enough to be followed readily
 and shall be just and practicable is
 poor. And he looks with distrust on
 the results of the action of the courts
 set in motion as they must be in great
 degree by the will of the president
 and the initiative of the attorney
 general. In the situation as it is,
 there is far too much doubt on the

one hand and far too much official dis-
 cretion on the other for the best in-
 terests of business, which means for
 the interest of the whole vast popu-
 lation of the land.

The remedy, he believes, is in right
 legislation, that is to say, in the
 amendment of the anti-trust law. He
 suggests that such amendment can
 and should be attained through the
 patient and candid hearing of the re-
 presentatives of all classes of interests
 from the trust magnates to the work-
 ingmen and the consumers. Possibly
 situation is not so bad, or at least
 so hopeless, as he intimates, since
 there is now going on a process of re-
 adjustment and winnowing through
 the operation of the courts that has
 had some good results and may have
 better. But in any case it is well that
 a prominent leader in the progressive
 movement should recognize the need
 of an adequate hearing on all sides
 and of action only on the discussion
 of what such hearing may bring forth.
 The temper of many of those most
 active in that movement has been
 too much like that of the Queen in
 "Alice in Wonderland," whose prompt
 verdict on anyone who differed from
 her was "Off with his head!"—New
 York Times Editorial.

RAILROAD LINE TO BEND TO OPEN FIRST OF MONTH
