A CHANGELING PROSPERS NOT

THE example of the man who changes his line of business or location too often is one to be gazed at intently and then turned away from.

He lives on the makeshift plan. He never has anything. He accomplishes nothing that is of material good for himself or his fellows. He may be a "good fellow" in the popular sense of the term, but that, after all, is a hollow honor by itself.

The goodfellowship up with something else, and you have something.

Nothing more was heard of him in the public prints until within the last few days, when, according to a press dispatch, his daily paper in a western town gave up the ghost.

Just what the cause has been of this man's difficulties is not known. He may have been a changeling at heart, and again he may have changed through adversity, for there are exceptions to the rule of prosperity as well as to other rules. But at any rate, it is a fair inference that he has not prospered, and that his failure to prosper is his own fault.

He has been a wanderer over the face of the land, East and West, gaining nothing. If he had stayed with his clerical aim, in which he was strongly lauded and had all the encouragement a reasonable man could ask, he would have, in all likelihood, been one of the leading evangelists of the time.
