OPENING A RESERVATION

ASSURANCE has come from Gen-
 eral Manager E. E. Calvin of the
 Southern Pacific that the Natron-
 Klamath cutoff, which is expected to
 place this city on the main line of the
 railroad and cut the running time be-
 tween Portland and San Francisco
 several hours, that work on the short
 line is not to be abandoned, but will
 be pushed to completion, probably by
 the spring of 1913.
 This will be a great impetus to the
 settling of the Klamath country.
 Nothing could be done, possibly—
 at least no single accomplishment—
 which would work for the growth of
 this region like the introduction of a
 through line of railroad past our
 doors.

The next best thing to this would
 be the opening of the Klamath In-
 dian reservation to settlement by
 homestead claimants. There appears
 to have been no very great amount of
 energy expended locally on the work
 of getting this matter brought to a
 focus, but it is something that were
 better not overlooked.
 If the railroad gets its through line
 into operation via Klamath Falls this
 will give a great stimulus to the re-
 servation-opening proposition. On
 the other hand, the opening of the
 reservation would work the same way
 toward the completion of the rail-
 road. If there were enough people in
 the Klamath Basin to make it an ob-
 ject to the railroad company to push
 to a finish through here the chances
 are that the railroad company could
 get the work done, possibly, by next
 fall.

The opening of the reservation
 would help to make it an object to
 the railroad to get this territory tap-
 ped by a through route. The sooner
 the reservation is opened the better
 for the neighborhood, and the sooner
 the railroad is running its through
 trains through this city, the better
 for everybody hereabouts.

What is the use of waiting for the
 railroad. In effect, to open the reser-
 vation? Why cannot the citizens ac-
 celerate this?
 As the years pass the homesteads
 of the government become more
 scarce and the greater are the masses
 of people who search for some gov-
 ernment land on which to make their
 homes. The following is an extract
 from the Chicago Tribune of a week
 ago:
 "Gregory, S. D., Oct. 19.—The total
 registration for lands in the Rosebud
 reservation here at 10 o'clock today
 was 18,014. Ten heavily loaded trains
 from the East landed a large number
 of persons here yesterday. Fully 500
 were quartered in private houses.
 About three times that number occu-
 pied the hotels and special quarters
 that have been provided. Promoters
 of new town sites in Mollie county
 have flooded the town with flaming
 posters announcing lot sales to be
 held here."

It shows that over 18,000 people
 had registered for lands to be allot-
 ted, and is a fair index of what would
 happen here if the reservation were
 opened.

 lows' cemetery.

Jack Kelsey, a well known resident
 of Palisad, was here for several days
 attending court and transacting busi-
 ness. Mrs. Kelsey accompanied her
 husband on the trip.

Jesse Parker of the M. C. ranch in
 Warner Valley, was a visitor in town
 the past few days, where his son was
 a witness for the state in the trial of
 Hige Archie.

Joe Tull, the Klamath county
 rancher, whose place along the road
 between Bly and the county line is a
 well known place for stopping about
 meal time, was a visitor here this
 week.

A large number of homesteaders are
 in town from Eastern points. The
 most of them have been looking for
 homesteads and desert lands, though
 a few are after timber claims.

Messrs. Thruston, McGrath, Erick-
 son and Causey are after big game
 in the Port Warner section of the
 county, and promise to bring back
 enough animals to supply many folks.

F. Fiash of the Matchless store
 had the misfortune to lose his house-
 hold goods and many valuable papers
 in the recent fire at New Pine Creek.
 The goods were in charge of a freight-
 er, who lost all his wagons and prop-
 erty in the fire.

Manager Friday of the Warner Val-
 ley Mercantile company at Plush, was
 a visitor in town this week, looking
 after the interests of his firm, who
 lost heavily in the fire at New Pine Creek.
 Six of the finest animals freighting in
 this section of the state belonging to
 the company were burned, together
 with a large amount of goods con-
 signed to the store.

Dan Malloy's opera house at New
 Pine Creek was among the buildings
 destroyed by the fire. Mr. Malloy had
 only \$500 insurance on the building,
 and feels that hereafter he will in-
 sure his holdings to the limit. He
 does not know whether to rebuild or
 erect a large hotel on the property, or
 combine the two.

Thomas Sherlock, the well known
 stockman and rancher, brother to
 Charles Sherlock of Lakeview, is
 spending a little time here on busi-
 ness. Mr. Sherlock is now a resident
 of Davis Creek and Alturas.

The sale of some fine fruit lands is
 reported from Davis Creek, where a
 party of Chicago men bought about
 200 acres lying two miles north of
 the town, which they will subdivide
 into smaller tracts and sell to people
 from Illinois.
