LETTERS FROM THE PEOPLE

Who Are the Knockers?

Some time ago one of our local papers published a story about an old farmer whom the papers claimed had given this country a terrible knock. He had told a stranger who had not yet been taken in that one morning last May the bushes here had been covered with snow. The paper devoted a long article to denounce this farmer, and said they hoped he was the only one of his breed. Now that farmer may have told the truth, only perhaps the stranger misunderstood what the farmer meant by the bushes being covered. I cannot understand how any country can be knocked by having the truth told about it, but I can well understand that a boost, based on misrepresentation can turn boomerang and become the worst kind of a knock, even if it might benefit some individuals for the time being.

In this article, however, I wish to call attention to a different set of knockers and compared to their brand of knocking the knock of the old farmer is very insignificant indeed. I refer to our city administration.

As you all know, this city is just recovering from a typhoid epidemic--the worst in its history. When it first made its appearance the health officer had the city water examined, in order to determine the cause of the epidemic, and found it impure and dangerous to health and life. He recommended boiling it as a precaution. He so reported to his superiors, the mayor and city council, but I have not heard that this honorable body took any radical action more than ordering some workmen to tear down an old barn, which action the city had to pay damages. I am told that the water company made some voluntary efforts to purify the water. What they were I have not learned. There were a few radicals who urged that the storage tanks be cleaned out, but the mayor said the company gave reasons why this should not be done. Those reasons, he said, seemed sufficient to him. He did not state what they were. Evidently he did not care to take the public into his confidence.

In the city of Milwaukee about a year ago they were threatened with a typhoid epidemic similar to what we have had here, but there the city fathers, as soon as they learned that the cause was impure water, set to work immediately to erect a purifying plant. The temporary plant was erected at a cost of only a few hundred dollars. Chloride of lime was used in the proportion I believe, of 1 ounce of lime to 65 gallons of water, and they escaped with only a few cases. But then, we must remember, that in Milwaukee they have municipal ownership of their water system--they have a socialist city government, who looks after the welfare of the people instead of their own selfish interests. However, we could hardly expect the water company operating here to do likewise. Are they not in business to make dividends primarily and to furnish pure water incidentally? Still, some of us would like to know if this city has not a contract with the Klamath Falls Water and Light company to furnish us with pure water? If so, they could certainly be made to do so if the city administrators had backbone as stiff as a piece of wet tissue paper. In the case of this city the typhoid epidemic was allowed to run its course. At one time there was about 100 cases here. Now, since the cooler weather came on the disease is gradually disappearing. I will not dwell on the suffering and want which it has caused, especially where the victims happened to be among working people, but the damage it has done to this city in dollars and cents will be with us for a long time to come, for who could wish to come and live in a disease-ridden city? It is a well known fact that typhoid fever is almost wholly due to unsanitary conditions, and in particular to impure water, and who are responsible for these conditions in this city? Surely our city government to which is entrusted the affairs of the city. These conditions have done more to knock this country than what \$5,000 worth of advertising can overcome.

Klamath Falls has come to be known as an unhealthy place, while, with our splendid climate and beautiful surroundings, it should be an ideal health resort. Now, who are the knockers? What about municipal ownership of water and light, which was voted on here last spring, and which carried with such overwhelming majority?

After seven months of deliberation the only thing the mayor has done toward it was to send out Mr. Emmitt to look for water, and when that gentleman made his report to the council he did not even act on his report. Are not the mandate of the people going to be obeyed?

But while we may criticize the city authorities for the apparent laxity in the performance of their duties, in the last analysis the blame must fall

on the voters who elected them to office.

By the way, Mr. Voter, who did you vote for at the last election? The socialists came before you with candidates representing a party which has for its object the uplifting of the whole human race. It has for its object to create healthy sanitary conditions for all the people by abolishing poverty and want, and they mean to accomplish that by collectively owning the means of production and distribution, and thereby giving to all the workers the full social product of their labor. The socialists stands for economy and efficiency in municipal governments and they have already demonstrated their ability to do things of benefit to the people, in some parts of our country, where they are in control, but you turned them down. Did I hear you say that you voted for Sanderson et al because you feared if he was defeated some mischief maker might get in? Very well, then, and you got him, didn't you? With him you got a city in debt almost to the limit. You have got city warrants that go begging for buyers at 10 to 25 per cent discount. With him you have got liquor licenses passed contrary to law. You have had your streets paved at a cost far in excess of what it cost in other cities, and some are cruel enough to say it is a poor job at that.

For good measure you have got unsanitary conditions, putrid water and typhoid fever. Take your medicine. My only regret is that some of us who did not vote for these blessings have to share the dope with you.
