## MUCH ROAD WORK BEING DONE IN LAKE COUNTY

Lack of Men to Work on Highways Has Been Handicap, But Hard Licks Are Now Being Put in to Make Up Lost Time

LAKEVIEW, Nov. 6.—B. W. Farrow of Paisley, road supervisor for the district between Clover Flat and Summer Lake, is in town selecting a large supply of corrugated iron culverts for the work that he is doing on the roads of that section of the county. F. E. Anderson, the county commissioner from northern Lake county, is in charge of a crew of men in the Summer Lake Valley, where they are making some improvements on the highways. The lack of men to work on the roads has been a handicap this year, but from now on until bad weather a lot of work will be done by the men that are at work.

## VAST TERRITORY IS REDEEMABLE

**TERRITORY IN GOOSE LAKE VALLEY, WHERE NEW TOWN OF WENDELL HAS STARTED, CAN BE MADE GOOD**

LAKEVIEW, Nov. 6.—Wendell is the name of the new town that is being started on the N.-C.-O. railway, seven miles south of Lakeview, on the shores of Goose Lake, which is destined to become an important commercial point in the near future. The first name suggested for the town was "Snelling," in honor of V. L. Snelling of Lakeview, who has earned the title of "The Mark Twain of Central Oregon," but when Mr. Moran of New York came here he asked that he be allowed to name one town on the line, and Mr. Snelling gave way to him, so Wendell is the place that will receive a nice, steady growth from now on.

In addition to being located on the lake, it will be tributary to the entire portion of Goose Lake Valley on the west side of that body of water, as well as taking in thousands of acres on its north end, when the new road is made to connect these important points.

The building of the Drews reservoir by the Oregon Valley Land company and the taking up of every foot of available water that now goes to the lake through various irrigation projects, will tend to lower the lake at this point, and allow many thousands of acres tributary to Wendell to be taken up by settlers and tilled in a manner that cannot help but be remunerative to both farmer and merchant.

There is a well defined movement under way among a number of citizens in the valley throughout the county to try to have the old channel at the south end of Goose Lake, which was filled by a landslide in the early 50's, opened, so that the waters that backed up and formed the present lake will once more resume their way toward the sea by way of the Pitt and Sacramento rivers.

If this is done the area in Goose Lake of 129,000 acres of fertile lands

now under water will be reduced to less than 25,000 acres, as is indicated by the deeper places in its area. This opening of over 100,000 acres to tillage will be one of the easiest accomplished feats ever attempted in the states of California and Oregon, wherein the body of water lies.

W. Roche Pick of Lakeview, who has given much study to this project, and who has advocated the use of this water when it could be turned into other projects and reclaim so much land by so doing, believes that it will not cost more than \$100,000 to expose 100,000 acres, and at the same time leave enough water to satisfy the people that might feel that their esthetic sense would be injured were they to lose sight entirely of the water with which they have been so familiar.

Congressman Baker of California, Congressman Hawley and Lafferty of Oregon and the United States Senators from California and Oregon are to be requested to give this matter their attention, in the hope that the government will allow this work to go on under their supervision. Mr. Pick states that if the government will allow the land to be reclaimed he will see that the amount necessary is subscribed from people that will be glad to pay one or two dollars an acre to have it put through, thus doing away with any expense on the part of Uncle Sam.

He says the reclamation of these lands will mean that fully \$2,000,000 worth of farming territory at the extremely low price of \$20 per acre will be restored to use to which it was originally intended, and no one that is familiar with the project will believe that less than \$5,000,000 would purchase the lands were they now ready for cultivation.

If this were done and the lands cut up into 80-acre tracts, with water from artesian wells for irrigating such things as would do better with water than without, and only three persons estimated to a family, the lands that are now useless would support a population of 3,750 people, and towns like Lakeview, Wendell, New Pine Creek, Davis Creek and Atlantis would receive a share of a trade that would amount to hundreds of thousands of dollars annually, and give an impetus to the growth of the valley never dreamed of by the most optimistic booster.
