PROMOTE FARMING IS AIM OF INFANT LEAGUE

Tri-County Development Organization Wants an Agricultural Expert for Each County Appointed by a Special Commission

PORTLAND, Nov. 8.—The Tri-County Development League formed at Arlington the past week, composed of Morrow, Sherman and Gilliam counties, started something that promises to be of great permanent benefit to this state when it set on foot a movement for an agricultural expert for each county.

Extension of the work of the Oregon Agricultural college to a greater degree, throughout the state is desired, and a resolution was passed favoring the appointment of an agricultural commission in each county, composed of the county judge and two practical farmers. It is proposed that this board appoint a county agriculturalist who shall visit the farmers, study their problems, and help them in every possible way. Part of the expense is to be borne by the state and the remainder by the counties themselves. A committee, headed by President Duke of the league, was named to work out the details and frame a suitable bill to be presented to the next legislature.

The newly formed Tri-County League will meet three times a year, and a committee was named to arrange for the time and place of holding the fair showing the products of the three counties.
