HUNTING OF WILD HOGS UNIQUE OREGON SPORT

Animals Get Fat on Acorns in Fall,
 and Curry County Then Hags
 Enough for Winter Supply of Bacon
 and Hams

PORTLAND, Nov. 10.—Southern
 Oregon's coast country has a unique
 sport found nowhere else in the state.
 This is hunting wild hogs, the sea-
 son for which is now beginning.

Curry county people go back into
 the hills some distance from the
 coast and shoot enough hogs to fur-
 nish a season's supply of bacon and
 hams.

The hogs get fat in the fall of the
 year on acorns from oak trees in the
 Curry county forests.

They run wild and are common
 property, and are fierce enough to fur-
 nish real sport for hunters.

GREATEST MONEY MAKING INSTITUTION IN COUNTRY

Factory Run by Uncle Sam for Turn-
 ing out National Currency, Bank
 Notes, Postage and Revenue Stamps
 and Bonds

WASHINGTON, D. C., Nov. 10.—
 When it comes to making money
 there's a modest brick building under
 the shadow of Washington monument
 that "lays it over" any trust.

It is officially known as the bureau
 of engraving and printing.

It is Uncle Sam's factory for turn-
 ing out national currency, national
 bank notes, postage stamps, internal
 revenue stamps, bonds and other
 things of value.

Director J. E. Ralph tells about
 them in his annual report to the Sec-
 retary of the treasury. He thrills
 about the production of 67,113,000
 sheets of United States currency and
 11,526,526 of national bank notes.
 Postage stamps ran up to 97,521,793
 sheets, containing a total of merely
 10,045,737,297 stamps. Of the high-
 er priced postage stamps there were
 42,992 at \$1 each, 687,787 at 50
 cents, and 16,093,089 at 15 cents.
 The more common two-centers, with
 George Washington's likeness there-
 on, mounted up to an output of 5,
 130,249,018.

There were printed 84,011,264
 sheets of revenue stamps, 65,000
 sheets of United States and Panama
 bonds, and so on in other hundreds of
 thousands and millions. A large de-
 mand is reported for postage stamps
 prepared in coils for use in stamp
 vending and stamp affixing machines.

In connection with an investigation
 by the postoffice department it be-
 came important for the postmaster
 general to know how many postage
 stamps Ralph had on hand. A count
 was made that disclosed 1,311,319,
 607 stamps in the bureau vaults, and
 the number corresponded to the last
 one-cent stamp with the record in the
 books.

The count of postage stamps sug-
 gested a verification of all balances in
 the bureau. It was done, and showed
 2,056,047 sheets of blank paper and
 31,166,600 sheets of printed work in
 various stages of manufacture, these
 results agreeing with the official rec-

ords. The face value of these sheets
 was \$470,828,732.

The large number of notes returned
 to the department for redemption and
 which are canceled, thus necessitating
 printing of notes to replace them in
 circulation, suggested the idea some
 time ago that many of these notes
 could be washed and returned to cir-
 culation.

Investigation developed the fact
 that at least 30 per cent of these notes
 were not at all worn, but were simply
 soiled, and only needed cleansing to
 make them suitable for use.

Experiments have been carried on
 in a crude way, and have demon-
 strated the practicability of washing the
 notes, and there are now in process
 of construction two machines of dif-
 ferent principles, which it is believed
 will be very satisfactory for this work.

NO SANTA CLAUS MAIL WELCOME AT POSTOFFICE

Department at Capital Announces
 That Letters to Mythical Man Have
 Given Rise to Abuses, So Will Be
 Spurned

WASHINGTON, D. C., Nov. 10.—
 The postoffice department has an-
 nounced that it will give no co-opera-
 tion to benevolent persons who desire
 to spread Christmas cheer to poor
 children who write to "Santa Claus."

An order has been issued by Post-
 master General Hitchcock which dis-
 tinctly forbids any postmaster to dis-
 tribute "Santa Claus" letters to any
 charitable organization or benevolent
 persons.

The postmaster general explains
 that in December, 1907, permission
 was granted postmasters to turn over
 to charitable persons such letters, but
 many abuses arose from the practice,
 and the order has not been renewed
 for that reason. All letters of this
 character will be stamped "fictitious"
 and sent to the division of dead let-
 ters this year.
