APPLE SHOW TO BE HELD IN PORTLAND THIS WEEK

Premium List Attracts Many Exhibits From Leading Fruit Sections of the Northwest, and Special Prizes Are Being Offered

 PORTLAND, Nov. 12.—One of the finest locations in Portland has been secured for the Oregon apple show, November 15-18. It will be housed in the new Yeon building, corner of Fifth and Alder streets, and there is

every indication that it will be a big success. The premium list has just been issued, and is attracting a great deal of attention. Requests for space have come from far-away British Columbia and well known fruit sections of the Northwest will be represented quite generally. In addition to prizes offered for the most perfect apples, in almost any sized exhibit, is a special premium for 100-box lots and another for 50-box lots, open to commercial organizations of fruit growers' unions in the Northwest. Cash amounting to \$500 is offered in the first class and \$275 in the second.

NEW BACTERIOLOGIST AT AGRICULTURAL COLLEGE

Man From University of Wisconsin for Special Bolls Work at Oregon Farming College—Arrives First of Next Month

 CORVALLIS, Nov. 12.—Prof. T. D. Beckwith, head of the bacteriology department at the Oregon Agricultural college, has announced the appointment of a new assistant bacteriologist. A. F. Vass is the incumbent of the new position, made necessary because of the heavy demand upon the experiment station for soil analysis and other bacteriologic work.

After receiving his bachelor of science degree in the Kansas State Agricultural college in June, 1909, Mr. Vass spent a year in graduate study at his alma mater, devoting himself largely to soil, dairy and pathogenic bacteriology.

Last year he was a graduate student at the University of Wisconsin, under Professors E. G. Hastings and Conrad Hoffman, and received his master of science degree from that institution last June. There he added water bacteriology to his other study, and did some soil work in the experiment station.

The results of some of his investigations, conducted in conjunction with Professor Hoffman, are about to be issued as a bulletin from the Wisconsin experiment station. He also made a study of immunity in the University laboratories at Wisconsin. He is at present at Glasco, Kans., but will come to Oregon to take up his college duties December 1st.

LINER MINNESOTA FLOATS SAFELY WITH HIGH TIDE
