MURDOCK REPORTS ARSON BY REBELS AMONG ALIENS
Rebel Leaders, at Instigation of Foreigners, Seize and Execute Manchu Incendiaries—Americans Nearly All Leave Nanking

WASHINGTON, Nov. 13.—Admiral Murdock cables that Manchus attempted to set fire to the Foo Chow foreign settlement.
Rebel leaders at the instigation of foreigners seized and executed a large number of Manchu incendiaries.
Fighting has been resumed at Nanking. Practically all Americans have left the city.

OATS GROW SIX FEET HIGH JUST TO SHOW GOOD FAITH
Clover Flat Rancher Sowed Seed on Ground Maligned by Neighbors, and the Entire Patch Shows Great Development
