## MENTAL EXPERT IS HINDU, LATIFF

ORIENTAL TELEPATHIST GIVES  
QUESTIONERS INFORMATION  
ASKED AS WELL AS IMPARTS  
ADDITIONAL DATA

A. Latiff, Hindu mentalist, showed his prowess in telepathy, as he calls it, last night at Houston's opera house and judging by the way he handled the questions asked him by his auditors, giving answers not only to the questions, but relating to other matters personal to the interrogators, about which no information had been requested, he will attract plenty of curious auditors the balance of the engagement, which will continue during the week.

He, wearing Oriental headgear and mantle, goes through the audience with envelopes containing blank cards—each card being numbered to correspond with the number on the envelope, so that the questioner who writes for information and signs his name on the card may hold his hand up when the number is called by Latiff. The writer puts his question in the envelope and seals the envelope, when the mimics are all then gathered by Latiff, placed in a plain glass globe, and he leaves this in full view of the audience, in front of the curtain.

Then the telepathist retires, the curtain falls, and a moving picture is thrown on the screen. By the time the picture is over the audience is naturally in a strong state of expectancy, and on the reappearance of Latiff everyone is on the qui vive.

Latiff does not touch the glass globe save to let some of the audience test the envelopes by opening them to see if the questions are still contained therein. Then he puts the globe back to its original position, takes a crystal, such, he says, as are used by Oriental wonder workers, which is nothing more nor less than a glass cube, and calls for the first number, asking the writer to hold up

his hand. He then tells the writer's name and makes reply.

The first question answered last night was about a change of location, and Latiff told the inquirer that the change would take place in six weeks, taking the interrogator from Klamath Falls, and would be beneficial.

L. M. Stearns, asking as to whether Ashland would be dry, was told: "I get 'good.' It will be so. You ask about the saloons."

One, Armstrong, asked as to leaving town. "I get no change for you," answered the mentalist.

Some one asked about how many marriages he would make, and Latiff said three. "I get 11, with one set of twins," was part of the revelation, which set the house in mirth.

A Mrs. Smith asked about a trip south, which he said she would get about Christmas, and was told about her spirit relatives who had long passed before, and about whom she had not asked.

On being questioned by Latiff as to whether she had ever seen him or communicated with him before she said no.

She also denied that there was any way in which he could have learned the facts.

The girl who asked whether she would get back the watch she had loaned to a youth was told that her male friend had pawned it.

"He has told you that he is having it repaired," said Latiff. "But this is not so. You can get it back by threatening him with the law, without trouble. He hears this, for he is not far away."

This hint that he was her escort was the cause of much merriment by the audience.

Latiff is apparently a man of considerable education, judging by his diction. He uses no offensive tactics, admonishes his audience not to ask foolish questions, and does not answer questions asked seriously in any way to offend the auditor.

In other words, he tries to keep the confidence of the person giving the question, and impart what he has to say in a way that will not cause any uneasiness to the seeker for information. He does not indulge in a long dissertation about what he claims is power, but carries his performance

out in an unpretentious and business like manner.

Geo. T. Wilson asked him "Whom do I think will be the next president?" which Latiff declined to answer, saying he could not read the mind, as he was not a clairvoyant. "To read the mind we must be more together and get the minds of us both on rapport," he declared.

Yenders, magician, adds considerable interest to the performance by skilled offerings in magic, such as removing from apparently hollow stovepipes a small menagerie, consisting of a rooster, bunny, pigeon and a guinea pig. The pigeon last night showed toward the timid bunny an inimical spirit, and pecked at him, which made the onlookers titter. Yenders rescued the "rabbit" and put him on a table, where he was free from persecution. Other tricks performed by Yenders were almost equally entertaining, and he kept a running fire of talk going to lead interest to his accomplishments.

The two people who give the program were assisted by the moving pictures, which added to the variety of the offering.

The attraction is one of the best seen in this city in a long time, and Manager John V. Hosuton deserves encouragement for securing it.

President Baker of Colorado State University, Urges Cultivation of Will Power in Young, to Retain the Best Knowledge

UNIVERSITY OF OREGON, Nov. 13.—President Baker of the State University of Colorado, visited the University of Oregon last Friday, and addressed the students in special assembly. He defended modern education from the attacks of the hypercritical, yet acknowledged that certain reforms in the methods and conduct of the education of the people of today ought to be instituted if the kernel of our national and social life is to be preserved.

"Above all else," Professor Baker said, "if we are to avoid superficiality and keep unto ourselves nothing but kernels of culture, we must cultivate in the young the power of will. Teach the young to endure, and as we teach endurance and resistive power, inculcate ideals through a study of the Bible."
